When this happens, the employer may be subjected to contempt of court charges, as he is preventing the employee from paying the courts.

> The law recognizes common-law relationships, Ms. McMillan stated, for purposes of support only and not property rights. If a relationship of more than five years breaks up, the women (or man) is entitled to support, but not matrimonial property rights. (Common-law is defined as two people living together.)

Ms. McMillan also cited a little known law regarding children over the age of 18. Children over this age must support their parents If they are unable to do so them-

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
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
