McCague says

Region fights its own battle

The provincial government will not step in or interfere with a decision concerning the location of a landfill site in Halton Region, even if the situation reaches the state of emergency, according to the Minister of the Environment.

Questioned by reporters last week George McCague said the province couldn't very well step in after the regions had been given the responsibility for waste disposal.

McCague made it clear that the province had no intention of taking over responsibility for landfill sites and suggested that he didn't feel the environmental standards set by the province were too stringent.

From time to time Regional Chairman Ric Morrow has said that if no alternative to Site F in Milton is found before the region reaches the end of the line in its current landfill sites, that the pro-

vince could issue a ministerial order directing that Site F be used as a landfill site. He said that step could be taken to protect the safety of the people in the region.

The Minister did say that there is a move underfoot to expedite the approval procedure for landfill site applications.

Under current legislation it is necessary for a municipality to go before the Ontario Municipal Board and then

later make application to the Environmental Review Board.

But McCague says he favors amendments to the Planning Act and the Municipal Act that would allow the application to the two bodies to run concurrently. That could save several months.

The Minister said there are three ministries, including his own, along with Housing and Treasury and Economic Affairs, that are involved in the proposal to have the two hearings go at the same time.

He told reporters he didn't feel the current legislation was too strong or restrictive. Regional officials have said that it is almost impossible to get a landfill site approved by seemingly endless routes of appeal.

"We live in a day and age when everyone wants to be heard and if we want that is the route we have to follow. The duplication of hearings seems to be the real problem," McCague said.

McCague was in Milton and Acton Wednesday for a luncheon with regional officials and later an official opening of the Acton Pollution Control Plant expansion. Regional Chairman Morrow was attending the same function.

Morrow said the region would welcome the responsibility for landfill and felt that was the most logical level of government to handle it.

But he felt there would be one body serving both the role of the OMB and the Environmental Board. He said he felt the region would be in a better position to handle the responsibility if council were the final authority of appeal outside of an environmental assessment to assure safety.

McCague said grants are available for regions to take part in resource recovery schemes but the technology must be one that is approved by the minister.

He said he wasn't aware of any plant that could dispose of 100 per cent of a community's garbage. A story in a Toronto newspaper claims that such a plant is operating in Milwaukee.

McCague said he had not yet seen the Milwaukee plant. He noted there is no consensus among the experts concerning the best way to go in resource recovery.

Regional public works officials say that the story in the Toronto paper is incorrect and that even the Milwaukee plant can't handle 100 per cent of the municipal waste.

Four bandsmen tour Ontario

The military band of the Lorne Scots Regt. will have the honor of hosting four bandsmen from the Fifth Volunteer Battalion Royal Regt. of Fusiliers Military Band stationed in Coventry, Warwickshire, England.

W.O.K.L. Allen of the Lorne

Scots Military Band explains that there is a warm friendship between the Lorne Scots Regt. and its allied regiment the Royal Regt. of Fusiliers, with many exchanges of militia personnel.

Correspondence between W.O.K.L. Allen and Bandmaster W.O. Alan Briggs of the Royal Regt. of Fusiliers resulted in the first exchange of military bandsmen. The military band of the Royal Regt. of Fusiliers invited two area bandsmen at their expense to travel to England and play in their band during the Queen's Jubilee Celebration. They also stated that any other bandsmen and their

wives would be welcome. As a result six bandsmen, three of whom were accompanied by their wives, spent three weeks as the guests of the band, taking part in the ceremonies and touring England.

This spring a similar invitation was extended by the Lorne Scots Military Band to the Royal Regt. of Fusiliers Military Band. The four bandsmen will be here in time to rehearse and participate in The Change of Command Ceremonies to be held in Brampton on Sunday, June 25. The bandsmen and their wives will be touring southern Ontario

Mayor says Cut weeds

Paving of Main St. will commence "very shortly" says Ted Ballinger, deputy engineer for Halton Hills.

Mr. Ballinger explained that King Paving and Materials, the firm which laid the first coat last summer, expects to return to Acton "any day now". The work should take a very short time, the deputy engineer said and he doesn't expect traffic to be tied up at all. He suggested the road may be down to one lane in places, but will not be closed off.

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
