ORANGE CHIFFON PIE

1 envelope unflavoured gelatin
250 mL. sugar
1 mL salt
175 mL milk
3 egg yolks, slightly beaten
5 mL orange peel, grated
175 mL orange juice
2 mL lemon peel, grated
75 mL lemon juice
250 mL whipping cream, whipped
1 - 22 cm pastry shell, baked

Combine gelatin, sugar and salt in saucepan. Add milk and egg yolks. Cook and stir over medium flame until mixture thickens slightly. Remove from heat, add juices and peels. Chill until partially set. Fold in whipped cream. Chill until mixture mounds. Fill pastry shell. Chill.
