

\$1000 to fix arch at Acton town hall

Temporary repairs to the Acton town hall, where a stone has fallen out of the arch support have been estimated between \$900 and \$1,000.

The estimate was made by Bob Reynolds, who pointed out some of the existing brick work would have to be remortared.

Chairman Russ Miller, at finance committee Monday night, said according to these costs if eight stones fell out it would come to the same amount as the demolition costs.

Councillor Peter Morris asked if the Save the Town Hall Committee is still active.

Councillor Peter Marks said they are extremely active, but suggested they may be asked for a progress report.

Miller said if the committee is being successful in fund raising the town should pay

the cost of temporary repairs, but if the committee is unsuccessful, it would be silly to spend the money.

Marks said it would be much more economical to renovate the whole building at once.

The committee decided to send the letter from Works Superintendent Frank Morette, telling the cost of repair, to the Save the Town Hall Committee and ask them for a report on their fundraising activities.

Five graduate from Sheridan

Five Acton students graduated this spring from Sheridan College.

A total of 1,298 students graduated from Sheridan College last week during the college's tenth annual convocation.

The students, from more than 60 full-time and part-time programs, received their diplomas and certificates at three separate graduation ceremonies — two at the Oakville Campus June 8 and one at the Brampton Campus June 9.

Sheridan College President John M. Porter, convocation speaker for each ceremony, urged graduates to think carefully about the kind of life they are going to create for themselves.

"What you shout into the woods will come back to you," he said, quoting from an old German proverb. He counselled them to "create a

proper attitude" towards their jobs; to give to life as much as they expected to get out of it.

"Love is so much better than hate, beauty better than ugliness, truth better than falsehood," said Porter. "So many people, as they get older, regret not having done certain things. Make moments out of your lives, create events and glory in the events that happen to you."

Above all, he advised, maintain a sense of humility. "It is almost always the ignorant person who thinks he knows all the answers, when very often he doesn't even know the questions."

"An educational institution fails not by graduating people who think they're ignorant but by graduating people who think they know it all," said Porter.

The total number of 1978 graduates included 14 from Sheridan's Heavy Equipment School in Milton, who received their diplomas during a special ceremony last month. Students from the college's School of Nursing in Mississauga will graduate in August.

Interested entrants are requested to contact show committee members Avril Astles at 878-3993 or Jackie Stroud at 853-1687.

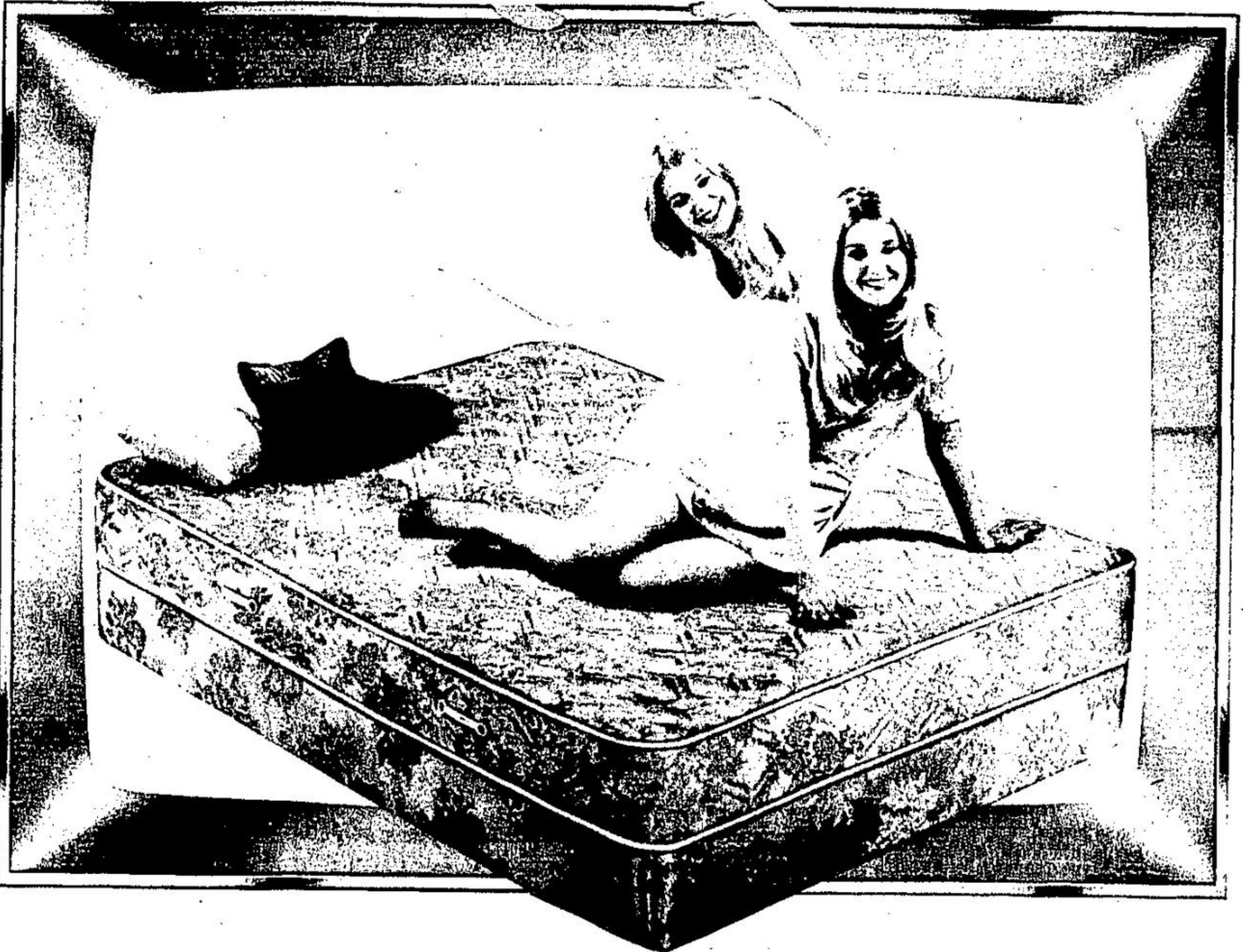
The show is to be held at the Lindvik Farm on First Line, north of Acton.

Judging the show will be Carol Jungherr from Salem, New York. She is well known throughout the United States

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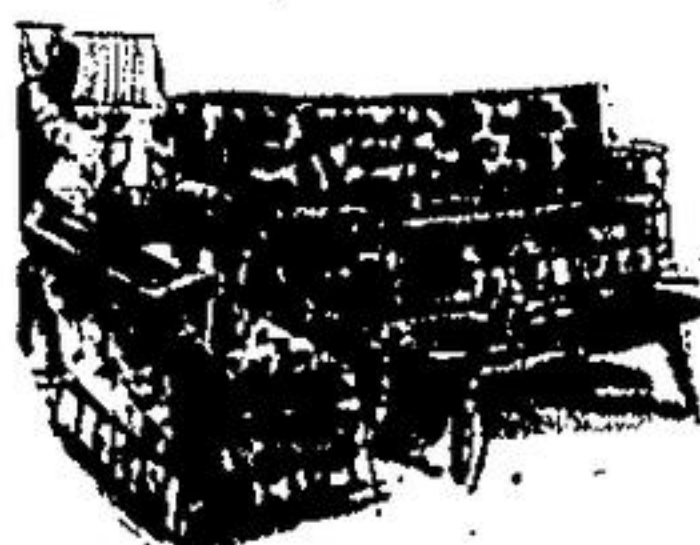
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Registration
