## Council rejects workload

A proposal that would have required Halton Regional Councillors to be at committee meetings at the region one full day every second week was soundly defeated when it went before Halton Regional Council Wednesday.

The councillors all sit on one committee each, with eight councillors sitting on a second committee under the current system.

Councillors attend one standing committee and one council meeting each month as well as other special meetings that arise from time to time.

Under the system advocated by Chairman Ric Morrow, councillors would each have sat on two standing committees.

Council wouldn't go along with that, but preferred four committees with six councillors on each committee. Each councillor will be on one

committee under the new arrangement scheduled to come into effect after the election.

Chairman Morrow told reporters he felt the councillors should sit on the extra committee to broaden their knowledge of the region and make a contribution on a broader scale. He suggested that for the \$9,300 a year councillors receive for sitting

on the regional council, they should be willing to dedicate at least one day per week.

Some councillors saw it as a move towards a committee of the whole system and opposed it on that basis. Burlington Councillor Ben Ciprietti reminded councillors that the budget and the landfill issue had been dealt with at committee of the whole and they were poorly handled.

Public Works Chairman Jack Raffis said he favored the smaller committee that allowed councillors to delve into a specific area of the region's work.
