
Peewees double Milton

Sabres to stay in Jr. B

Acton Sabres will be playing their third year in OHA Junior B play next season, it was decided at a team meeting Monday.

According to past manager and public relations manager Bill Campbell, about 15 people turned out to the meeting willing to work for the team, and they have decided to carry on.

Extra travelling distances caused by the addition of Thornhill, Oak Ridges, Barrie and Orillia to the league had threatened to shut down both the Acton Sabres and the Georgetown Gemini.

Sabres finished this season in the black according to Campbell, "but not by much". Gemini, as did most teams in the loop, lost money over the year.

A letter of intent to play in the league next year has to be sent to the OHA by June 15, tomorrow.

Campbell did not rule out the possibility of the Sabres dropping back to Junior C sometime in the future. We have to see how we do in Junior B, financially and in players."

The Sabres moved up to Junior B two years ago because of the high costs of travel in the Junior C loop. Now, according to Campbell, the costs are about the same.

He was especially encouraged to see members of the team itself out working to keep the team going. He pointed out players are usually not very involved with the running of the team off the ice, and credits Bruce Chapman for awakening this interest in his players.

An open election for officers and an executive will be held next Thursday. Milt Ball, current president, and Don Perry, treasurer, have declined to run again.
