Forty-seven members of Dublin Women's Institute and their friends enjoyed the annual bus trip of the Branch on Monday, June 12. The first stop on the trip was at Hanover, where a tour of the piano works was enjoyed by everyone. Details and intricacies in the manufacture of pianos were explained by guides, and all were intrigued with the precision that was required by many of the workers. A picnic lunch was enjoyed in the beautiful park at Hanover. Unfortunately, as the trip neared its destination of the Bruce Nuclear Power Development at Douglas Point on the shores of Lake Huron, near Kincardine, heavy rains and fog set in. Films were shown in one building and then a tour of some of the project was taken with two guides boarding the bus and giving the commentary. The property now covers 2,300 acres with more being added from time to time. It is one of the largest nuclear-electric generating stations in the world. Staggering figures were given in the development of this project of Ontario Hydro which will take quite a few years to complete, an example being the \$20,000,000 link wire fence surrounding the property. On the return trip, the weather improved considerably. The ladies were startled when they were driving south of Listowel and saw huge clouds of black smoke emerging from a burning car. Dinner was served at The Stone Crook at St. Jacob's and all enjoyed it very much. Mrs. H. Besley, Mrs. W. Lasby and Mrs. A. Murchison had arranged this fine trip, which included considerable entertainment on the bus. G. Aitken, of Denny's Bus Lines, was the efficient driver of the day.
