

Gerry Inglis to coach Raiders

Georgetown Chrysler Raiders have named Gerry Inglis coach of the Intermediate "A" hockey team for the 1978-79 season, ending speculation that they would have an ex-pro behind the bench next season.

Inglis, dubbed "Mr. Championships" by longtime Georgetown supporters because of his unmatched success with midget, junior and intermediate teams, is returning home after two sub-par seasons with the Tier 2 Junior "A" Dixie Beehives and two better than average campaigns with the Junior "B" Milton Flyers in which that club made the OHA Central Junior "B" group finals two years in a row.

He says new rules, which allow unlimited imports and eliminate the homebrew quota, don't change the most important part of the game. "If you don't work at it, you don't win and if you've got a good working group behind you, you've got a good chance to win it all," he said.

championship club in Georgetown. His critics claim he advocates roughhouse hockey and that he once turned several good homegrown prospects away from the Raiders by chopping them from the roster and keeping imports.

With Inglis gone, the Milton club has signed former Sheridan College coach Doug Peters as coach. Peters was replaced at Sheridan recently by Murray Child, a member of the OHA technical staff. Child will be assisted by Raider player Steve Blundy and Georgetown's Bill Richmond, a Level 5 NCCP instructor.

In 1974, with Inglis at the helm, Raiders won their third straight OHA championship and made it to the Eastern Canadian semi-finals where they lost to the Embrun Panthers in a best of three series which went the limit. Now, Inglis says he wants another crack at winning the Hardy Cup, emblematic of Canadian intermediate hockey supremacy.

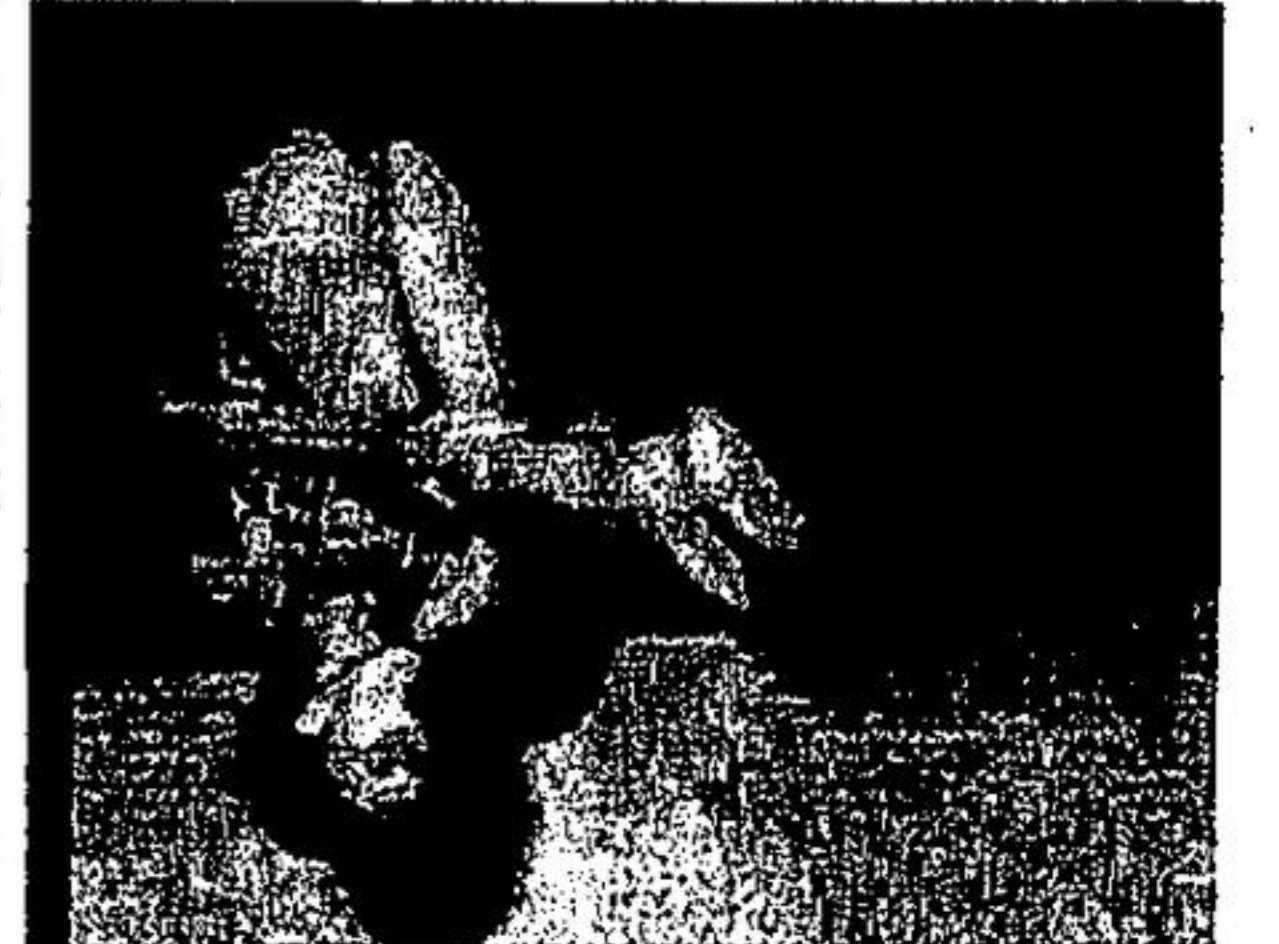
"Everything was A-OK in Milton. It's the best place I've ever been," Inglis said this week. "I just wanted a change and a shot at the Hardy Cup. You have to go for the top or there's no sense in going."

At a press conference in the Georgetown Chrysler showroom, Saturday, Inglis said he took the Raider job on the condition that he has full say on what players are with the team, including the final say. He revealed this week that he passed up offers from two Tier 2 Junior "A" clubs to rejoin the Raiders, but would not say which clubs made the offers.

Inglis says he hasn't seen many intermediate "A" games since he left the Raiders in 1974, but the former hardrock Raider rearguard

Inglis said he was first approached about taking the Raider job about three weeks ago. The guessing is that Raiders went after Gerry after ex-pro Tom Martin, a Milton resident, declined an offer to coach the Georgetown club, in order to return to Sweden where he coached last winter.

Raiders will open their training camp at Alcott arena, August 28, but won't do any dry land training, their new coach says. Inglis says he doesn't believe in dry land training. "The hockey season
