Board of Ed. objectives revised, become 'goals'

Haltom Board of Education approved changes in the original statement of the Objectives of the Haltom Board of Education at Thursday's meeting. Trustees praised the updating as a reflection of what the public thinks education should be striving for.

Trustee Judy Alexander (Oakville) said the updating was the best thing the board had done this year.

Trustee Bert Hinton (Acton-Esqueving) said he acknowledged the improvement but the board should now practice what it preaches. He said the public would judge the changes on how they were implemented.

Director of Education Emmerson Lavender outlined changes to the board explaining the revised statement referred to the "goals" of the board rather than objectives to indicate the "ultimate destination" and to avoid confusion with the present use of the term "Objective."

Among the changes were:

Original—We believe in the individuality of all children. School programs should allow each child to develop his potential to the fullest extent within the limitations of the resources available to the Board.

Revised—We believe in the individuality of all students and recognize their varying rates and styles of learning. We believe also that there are many characteristics that students have in common which may be accommodated in program and organization.

Original—Although we recognize that schools should establish their own priorities, the type of student we hope to develop should be one with:

Revised—Within the limitations of physical and human resources available to the Board, we believe that school programs should allow each child to develop his potential to the fullest extent.

Original—b) The ability to research information from a body of knowledge. c) The

ability to select and evaluate information.

Revised—b) The ability to research, select and evaluate information.

Original—The ability to make reasoned judgments.

Revised—The moral sensitivity necessary for a complete and responsible life.

Original—e) An inquisitive attitude towards knowledge.

f) A wholesome conviction of self-worth.

Revised—g) The self-discipline to function effectively in the community.

Original—An awareness of the needs and rights of others.

Revised—A respect for the needs, rights and property of others.

Comment—The change in the revised statements is on the attention given to the need to respect the property of others, including public property, our property.

Original—The awareness of that which is creative within him and some experience of the intellectual discipline of the arts.

Revised—The awareness of creativity based on some experience in the discipline of the arts.

Revised—A commitment to physical fitness.

Comment—The statement on physical fitness is added because of a growing realization of the connection between fitness and effectiveness of a student, or a teacher or anybody. While recognizing the extent of present physical education programs within the school day, this goal statement does not mean that daily physical education class will be compulsory for every student K-13.

Original—We believe that these objectives can be achieved best through the application of the principle of continuous progress. Children learn at different rates, at different times, in different areas of study, by different methods of teaching. Learning must

have continuity so that gaps or unnecessary duplication in instruction do not appear. Within the policies of the Board, each school should be allowed latitude to evolve a program. Patterns of staffing, design of schools, integration of program, and varieties of program between schools should all be directed towards the objectives listed above and based on the principle of continuous progress.

Ultimately, children should be allowed to progress in every learning area and from division to division at any time during the year with the concurrence of the principal, parent and teacher.

Comment—The most obvious change in the revised goal statement is the deletion. As the Board considered the original statement of objectives, it realized that the first two paragraphs dealt with statement or goal or the "what" of education. The last paragraph dealt with method or process of the "how" of education. As such, it did not belong in a goal statement.

As indicated above, the Board continues to recognize the individuality of children and it accepts the fact of varying learning rates, styles and methods. On the other hand, the Board believes that, in some cases, we have over-emphasized, and have become unnecessarily pre-occupied with, individual differences and we have de-emphasized commonalities among pupils.

No change in holidays

Haltom Hills Library Board will stick with its vacation schedule of holidays for librarians despite a recommendation from Haltom Hills council that the board follow town guidelines.

"How far should the board allow itself to be guided by council?" asked Librarian Betsy Cornwell. If they regard me as a department head then a comparison of pay schedules shows the chief librarian not paid the same, in fact is several steps down the grade. She said comparisons between vacations for town staff and library was like comparing apples and oranges.

The town is concerned that some department heads will want the same vacation benefits as librarians, commented board chairman Dick Howitt.

"I doubt if the other department heads would exchange salaries," Mrs. Cornwell replied.

Member Norm Elliott suggested the board reply to the town outlining the differences, noting the librarian's vacation schedule was an effort to eliminate differences in pay schedules by making it up with vacation credits. It doesn't have to comply with town policy, he declared.

"There's no reason to change policy," concluded board member Doug Magwood.

At a meeting May 10 the board decided the chief librarian should receive four weeks' vacation after one year and other professional librarians three weeks' vacation after one year and four weeks after five years.

Robert Bailie was the region's first Director of Public Works and was instrumental in setting up the department.
