

Trustees approve request for student tour of China

Although several trustees opposed the Board of Education endorsing trips, especially outside Canada, the Board approved the request of M. M. Robinson high school teacher David Trueman to organize a student tour to Mainland China March 10-30 of 1979. The resolution passed provided there is no cost to

the board. The trip is proposed for March instead of the summer Lavender told the board

Cost per student for the tour would be \$2,495, which includes all transportation, accommodation, tours, entertainment and meals.

Members of the Halton Office Personnel Association crowded in Halton Board of Education board room last Thursday night to hear trustees approve a new salary scale which would give secretarial and clerical staff a 5.19 per cent composite

salary increase. The board approved a 5.95 per cent increase in scale overall for secretaries and other clerical staff and a 3.42 per cent increase for other Trustee Fred Armitage

(Burlington) asked for a delay in changes in salary

schedules until next year because it was not included in this year's budget and would mean à two per cent increase in the budget, but his amendment was voted down in a recorded vote.

Salary increases in some of the higher categroles of nonteaching staff will be phased in from the present schedule to the revised.

Total increased cost without phasing is estimated to be \$386,647 equivalent to 11.88 per cent. Increased cost with phasing is estimated to be \$277,046, equivalent to 8.51 per cent.

credit courses. "We're not in the tour business," sald Millon trustee Ivan Armstrong, fearing a could provoke an international incident.

Milton trustee Bill Lawson also said he was alarmed by reports coming back from previous trips especially when they were outside the country. He also feared there might be an international incident one day.

Director Em Lavender said Lawson's disturbed him because his daughter had gone on a trip to France last year. However, he also recognized that in his own adolescence bragging had been part of any student activity and he suggested reports might be exagger-

As for the trip to China, "it would be rather resourceful for anyone in China today to whoop it up," Lavender declared with evident mirth. Acton-Esquesing trustee Bert Hinton sald he also could not understand adverse comments and supported a trip which could change the lifestyle of those partici-

Oakville trustee Len Auger said he was concerned because the students would miss 10 days of instruction. He wondered how they would make up the lost time?

Trustee John Bradley told the board he was initially concerned about the exposure to Communist China but realized the cost of the trip (\$2495) was so much only the wealthy could go and they weren't likely to be in-

fluenced much. Georgetown trustee Barry Shepherd said he approved of the trip but thought students should be briefed extensively before they leave on the importance

behaviour. Trustee Cam Jackson of Burlington recalled he benefitted from a trip to the Olympics under the wing of the Halton system and thought such tours should be encouraged:
