Joint Forces Operation

Undercover cops live lonely lives

It is a lonely job being an undercover police agent, and it is a job that holds little of the glamor depicted on television police shows.

Edward Island, the 31-year-old corporal now heads the Joint Forces Operation in Oakville to investigate drug crime in Halton region.

Although a "fantastic challenge," the position of undercover police agent includes a great deal of pressure, as well as the fact that "you are living a lie," according to Corporal Jenkins.
"It's a good job, but you do get mixed feelings. You are always sneaking around and you have to remember everything you say and do as your new identity."
"It's a tedious job, nothing like what you see on TV, but instead it involves a steady uphill grind."
Undercover agents are often isolated from friends and family and spend most of their time alone, with the exception of the hours spent on the street working to find information on drugs.
Agents' families can know nothing of their work or any information on particular cases. This ensures protection of one's immediate family and friends, as well as the officer involved, he explained.
A slipup by undercover men is costly and can result in attempts on an officer's life.
"It is dangerous and you can't stay undercover forever," he stated.
Evidence on a case has to be conclusive, before going to the courts, which usually proves to be the most tedious and hardest part of the case. Officers may know a particular chemist is manufacturing the drug, but until they actually see him making it, or collecting the money or see him with a customer, they don't have a case against him, he explained.
The harder and higher priced drugs are always the more difficult cases to solve, since drug dealers are much more careful and sophisticated in their cover-up methods, according to Corporal Jenkins.
He points out that undercover agents cannot at any time take any drugs while working on a case, which can sometimes lead to complications.
A dealer may grow suspicious and demand that the officer "hit it up" or "smoke up", before selling him the drug, said Corporal Jenkins.
"Then you have to have a quick and ready answer."

Training of undercover agents is done by ex-undercover police officers, who share their experiences and tactics, said Corporal Jenkins.
"But in the end, each individual has to do his own

thinking."
Corporal Jenkins now rarely works undercover, but admits there have been cases where he wanted to work directly in the case.
"I have met the challenge of working undercover, but it does not any longer hold the same appeal as it used to," he said.
As a senior officer with the Oakville operation, he said he now finds a new challenge in co-ordinating the efforts of police officers on drug cases.
The Joint Forces Operation was formed in January of this year and represents the joint efforts of RCMP, Halton Regional Police and OPP officers.
It is credited with being efficient and has proven results, including a recent drug bust in Milton.
On April 31, 1978, Milton had the largest drug bust of its kind, that resulted in the seizure of 70 pounds of Columbian-grown marijuana and the arrests of two people, charged with possession of the drug with the intent to traffic.
Although Corporal Jenkins would not disclose the number of men in the Oakville Unit, he said there have been as many as 40 undercover police officers working on one case.
Arrests are definitely on the increase, he said, and attributed the success of the arrests to the joint efforts of the various police forces.
The Joint Forces is not totally new. Prior to January this operation worked with OPP and RCMP officers, but it was then decided to also use regional police in an effort to use all possible police resources.
The link with Halton police is working well, he said.
"We don't run into duplicity of work and everybody is able to keep in touch on particular cases."

The Joint Forces Operation works solely on drug cases. "Milton does have a problem, but one that is no more than any other community," stated Corporal Jenkins.
The Operation depends on undercover intelligence gathering efforts and informants to solve its cases, he said, adding that manpower is called in from Toronto to assist with particular cases, as it is needed.
"The basic problem in drug enforcement is not knowing who is dealing," he explained, adding that drug crime has grown more sophisticated with the years.
Police methods of tracking down drug dealers and users, have also grown more sophisticated, he admitted. Corporal Jenkins would not elaborate on new equipment used to track down criminals,

but said the equipment is used "when necessary", and admitted telephone tapping is one method employed.
Marijuana continues to be the most widely used drug in Halton region, he said, owing to its availability.
"Marijuana and hash are fairly constant, because there are quite a few sources."
Harder drugs including chemical drugs "fluctuate", according to Corporal Jenkins.
"There are times when the chemical drugs are light and then heavy."
All drugs are available in Halton region with the one possible exception of heroin, he said, which is available in Toronto.
"The drugs are just as available in Halton as any other region, but for heroin,

they would have to go to Toronto.
One of the harder drugs on the market, LSD has been found in Georgetown, he said, as well as in Burlington and Oakville.
There are more drug activities in Burlington and Oakville, he stated, owing to the bigger population.

Although the majority of drug arrests in Halton involve marijuana smokers, Corporal Jenkins is not in a hurry to see drug laws change, despite the fact that marijuana is considered the mildest form of illegal drug.
"I would like to see the laws stay just the way they are now," he said, adding there are still not conclusive medical reports on the effects of the drug.
Marijuana smokers are becoming more discreet about their smoking habits, he noted.
"In my opinion, they are not so flagrant in their use of it and they are being more discreet about it."
Corporal Jenkins describes drug cases as a "victimless crime", where the solution to a case "depends upon the initiative of police."
With the exception of occasional informants, nobody comes to the police with information on drug dealers and users in the community, he explained.
Joint Forces Operations are now being set up across the country, he stated, and include such Ontario cities as Hamilton, Toronto, Peterborough, London, Orillia, Barrie and Mississauga.

Better apples grown at U of G orchards

University of Guelph research in horticulture may mean that school children one day may be handing the teacher, a better-shaped more tasty apple. They are already lurching on apples that were grown more economically and harvested at top quality through the use of University-tested growth regulators.
"Growth regulators" loosely refers to a group or organic chemicals which act like plant hormones to affect plant growth and behavior, explains horticulturist Professor B. J. E. Teskey. He and Dr. S. R. Miller of Agriculture Canada's Smithfield Experimental Farm, have recently written a Factsheet for the Ontario Ministry of Agriculture and Food which describes several of these regulators and makes recommendations for their use in commercial fruit orchards.
All chemical regulators on the market have been thoroughly tested to make sure the fruit contains no traces of them, says Prof. Teskey. They are not poisonous, he adds, but are simply synthesized versions of naturally-occurring plant hormones.
"They are marvelous tools for the farmer," says Prof. Teskey. "They enable the farmer to increase both the quality and yield of fruit at harvest time." He cites the example of Macintosh apples, where a 30 per cent loss due to preharvest drop is quite normal. A wind storm just before harvest could increase that loss to 80 or 90 per cent, says Prof. Teskey, since graded fruit must be picked from the tree, not from the ground. "In today's farming venture, the fruit grower is working so close to the margin of profit that such losses cannot be tolerated," he explains.
Growth regulators have helped to cut preharvest drop of Macintosh and other apples to only about five per cent. The judicious grower will use one spray to speed up the maturation process on some trees and rely on another spray to slow down the ripening of others. Still a

third regulator might be used just before drop to hold the fruit on the tree longer and improve the color for roadside sale. All of these regulators give the farmer a chance to spread out his harvest so that very little fruit drops before it can be picked.
Growth regulators have also reduced the need for expensive hand labor to prune the fruit trees and, later, thin the fruit. The OMAF Factsheet advises which regulators will help to bend the branches and open up the tree. Others, applied after flowering, will cause the weaker buds to drop off. "It improves size, color, and quality of the fruit, promotes regular annual bearing, reduces limb breakage and decreases grading costs," says Prof. Teskey. Still other chemical regulators can be used to control weeds in the orchard.
Prof. Teskey has recently been working at the University of Guelph with another chemical, not included in the OMAF Factsheet, to increase the length to diameter ratio of Delicious apples. Like other growth regulators now in commercial use, this particular chemical has no effect on the flesh firmness or yield.
The use of growth regulators in the orchard has not completely ruled out the effects of bad weather and the quirks of Mother Nature, admits Prof. Teskey, but they have given the farmer a tool to use in trying to avoid such natural disasters.

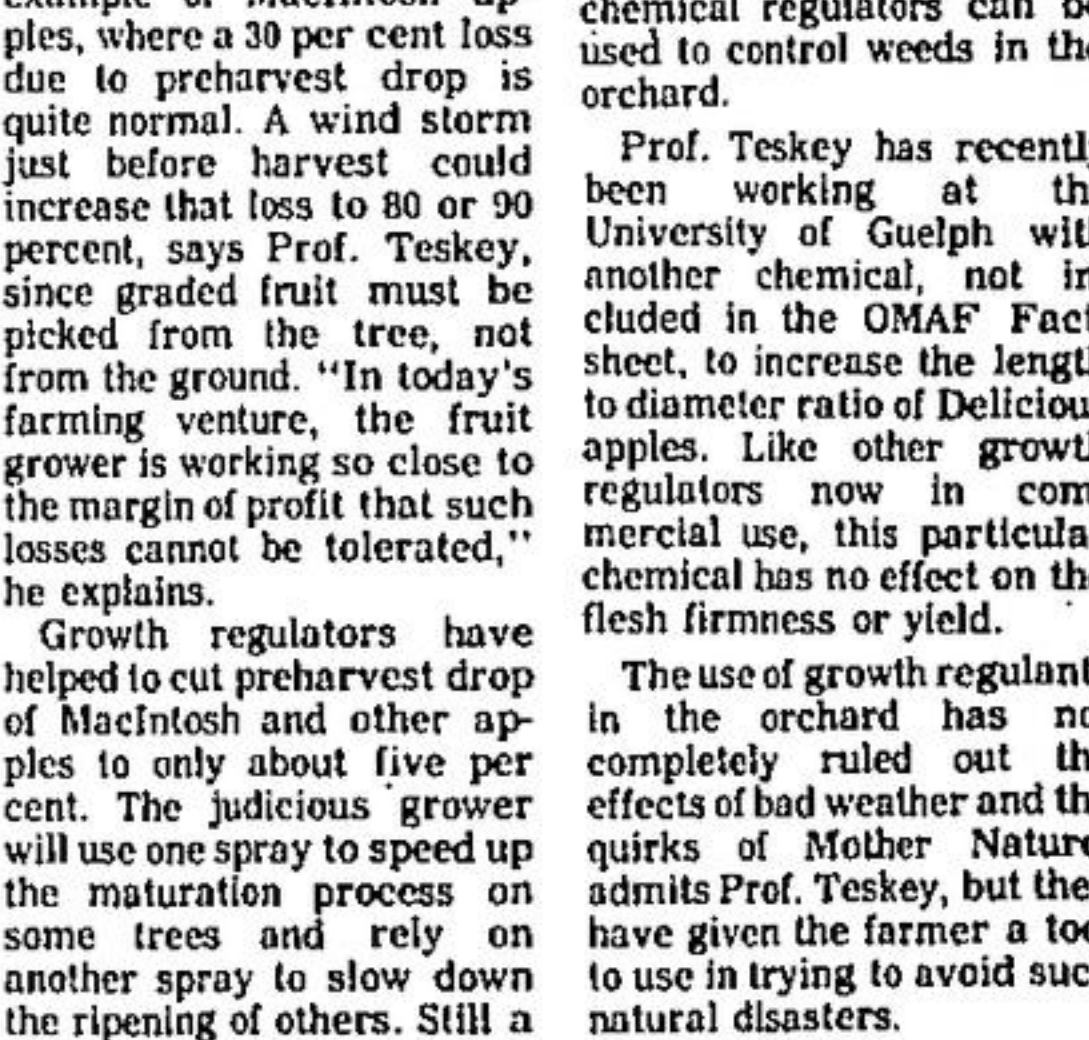
