

Selects nip Oakville first time in five years

On July 13 the Brookville Selects defeated the Ontario Championship Oakville team, 3-2. The game was well played defensively with both teams going three up, three down until the bottom of the 4th when Margo Butler of Brookville hit to get on base, and moved to 3rd on a hit by Sue McCallum, but was unable to score. No other runners were allowed on base by either team until the bottom of the 8th inning. Brookville pitcher Sue Thomson only had to hurl three pitches in the 7th to get the three Oakville batters out. Brookville then rallied in the 8th to score all 3 of their final

runs, then held the strong Oakville squad to 2 runs in the top of the 9th inning, ending the game after the top of the 9th. Scoring for the Selects were Donna Dennis, Laurie Kennedy, and Sandy Snow. It was the 1st time the Selects had beaten Oakville in 5 years. The Brookville Selects were defeated on Sunday by St. Catharines 2-1 in extra innings. Brookville loaded the bases during their 1st turn at bat but couldn't bring anyone home. Both teams then remained scoreless until the 3th when Sue McCallum hit out a single and was brought home on a hit by Beth God-

frey. St. Catharines brought in their 1st run in the 7th inning of the 7th game, to push the match into extra innings. Neither team was able to do anything at the plate again until the bottom of the 9th inning, when St. Catharines second and final score was brought in. The Selects record is now 9-9. Their next home game is Thursday against Six Nations. Game time is 8 p.m. behind the school. The 1st annual Brookville Selects 50-50 draw was won by Arthur Bryant of 285 Ontario Street, Milton. The draw, held on July 6, raised a total of \$572.50 which the winner will split with the Selects fastball team. A total of 1,144 tickets were sold for the draw.

Ump throws out Yukon's fat bat

Georgetown Chrysler Raider hockey star, Ray "Yukon" Evans, is used to putting the fat part of the bat on baseballs and sending them soaring out of the Campbellville ballpark on Sunday afternoons, but it gave him away during the Harley Motors Industrial Fastball Tournament on the weekend. Umpire Barry Jenkins thought he noticed something strange when Evans strode to the plate in the 1st inning of the semi-final game between Milton's Thornborrow BP and Harley Motors. He was right. "Yukon" was carrying an unusually large hunk of timber (whoops, I mean aluminum). Jenkins called time and relieved Evans of the "wagon tongue", which turned out to be a genuine Louisville Slugger, aluminum baseball bat. The subtle hint was that "Yukon" had his Sunday afternoons mixed up and that he'd better stick to regulation fastball bats when playing fastball.

Using his trusty fastball bat gauge, Jenkins discovered two more baseball bats in the Thornborrow collection and deposited them and Evans' Louisville Slugger on the opposite side of the fence protecting the Thornborrow bench. Jenkins said he'd also caught the Milton crew using the bats in an earlier game, Saturday. Evans, normally a reliable hitter, couldn't seem to connect no matter what bat he used in the tournament. He went 0-9 at the plate, although he reached base twice on errors and walked once. Thornborrow used "Yukon" at shortstop. The introduction of aluminum bats has placed added pressure on umpires. At first glance, it's difficult to tell the difference between a fastball and baseball bat. Aluminum bats are approved for use in the Halton County Senior Baseball League, although they are not yet allowed in the Major Leagues.

Hot pennant race in Intercounty

Hespeler and Fergus are tied for the Intercounty Fastball League lead in latest statistics released by statistician Everett Griffin of Fergus. The standings, however, do not include the two Glen Williams wins over Belwood and Orangeville, last week. Only six points separate the top five teams in the league and Hillsburgh and the Glen are not far behind the pennant contenders. The top eight teams qualify for playoffs at the conclusion of the 36 game schedule. Lloyd Manderson of Fergus leads the league in hitting with a .492 average.
