As of September 1st, 1978, first outlet costs will therefore be increased by \$1.00 (one dollar) per month for all subscribers, in accordance with Federal Government Authority, as decreed in CRTC Decision 78-457 dated July 11th, 1978.

SPECIAL NOTE: The foregoing will not apply to accounts paid on an annual basis prior to September 1st, 1978, until expiry of the prepaid period. Please call us to arrange annual prepayment if you wish to take advantage of these savings.

Initial service charges will increase to \$25.00 (twenty-five dollars) to defray installation, reconnection, relocation and associated overhead costs.

Monthly fees for additional outlets will not increase. Normal repair service calls will continue to be performed at no charge.

The Ontario Fire Marshal's office is investigating the cause of a blaze which levelled the Hank Van Zoelen barn on the Belfountain Road near the Erin Township line last Tuesday (July 18).

Twenty geese, a Holstein bull, two lambs and three sheep died in the fire. Three thousand five hundred bales of freshly cut hay, 400 bales of straw and a couple of tons of grain plus some farm equipment were also destroyed inside the barn.

About 600 persons watched the fire light up the night sky. Firefighters from Erin, Hillsburgh and Inglewood doused nearby buildings to keep them from catching fire.

The fire was discovered by Jest Van Zoolen when he returned home from work. He burned his hands in efforts to open the barn, but failed.

The new minimum wage rates

On August 1, 1978 new Minimum Wage rates will go into effect. Here

are the new rates: Effective **August I, 1978 General hourly rate Learner, hourly rate Construction and Guards at 3.15 construction sites, hourly rate *Hourly rate for persons employed to serve liquor in licensed premises 2.50 2.15 *Student, hourly rate Ambulance Drivers and Helpers, 136.80 Weekly Rate Hunting or Fishing Guides 12.50 less than 5 consecutive hours 5 or more hours whether or not 25.00 consecutive *Room and Board The following maximum rates apply when room and board are included in calculating the minimum wage: Room, weekly 1.15 Meals, each 24.00 weekly Room and Meals, weekly 35.00 *no change from previous rate "The entire work week in which August I falls
