Summer school accepts 2,000 students, adults

Summer usually means a break for school students but for some, the vacation time is considered as a prime opportunity to improve grades, pursue a new credit, or repeat a course they did not pass. This summer, more than 2,000 students in both elementary and high school grades are spending summer mornings in the classroom, as part of the Halton Board of Education summer school program. Reading and mathematics courses are being run each morning at McKenzie-Smith middle school for students in grades six through eight. A good attendance has been reported with students from McKenzie-Smith and St. Joseph's school making up the classes.

Many secondary school students, grades nine through twelve, are travelling from Acton to Burlington each day by bus. Summer school officials say that registration for a mathematics course at the high school were a little short to form a class this year. Officials are hoping to have one next year at Acton high. Sixteen schools in the Hal-

ton region are participating in the program with a crew of approximately 75 teachers. The program includes the co-operation of the Halton Separate School Board, which supplies both students and teachers. This summer marks the sixth year the program has been run for elementary students in Halton, and offers a variety of math and reading courses for grades six to eight. Math, English, science, and secretarial courses are among those offered to secondary school students. The courses are not limited to high school students, and adults are invited to attend, according to Willard Price,

principal of the summer school program. He stated many adults are interested in completing secondary school courses to qualify for college or university training, or even to satisfy a general interest in one subject. The secondary program will be conducted in Oakville at Queen Elizabeth Park School, 2301 Yolanda Drive, and in Burlington at Lord Elgin High School, 5151 New Street, until August 11. The elementary program continues until August 4 and offers remedial mathematics and language classes at senior elementary schools where there is sufficient registration to form classes.

In addition to the usual credit courses, the summer program is offering classes in driver education in Milton, Georgetown, Oakville and Burlington; and English for New Canadians, or anyone wishing to improve their spoken English, at Lord Elgin High School. Elementary courses in the North Halton area are being held at Robert Baldwin Public School in Milton, McKenzie-Smith Public School in Acton, Stewarttown Public School and Centennial Public School in Georgetown. Susan Thibodeau will be representing the Acton Fall Fair at the Miss C.N.E. Queen of the Fairs Pageant at the Canadian National Exhibition, Toronto, August 16. Miss Thibodeau will join other queens from across Ontario on Tuesday, August 15, at the Exhibition grounds. The girls are judged on Tuesday and all individually interviewed. On Wednesday morning they parade for the judges with a biography given by the host for each girl. After attending a luncheon with representatives from their fair executive, the girls are judged for the last time. Finalists present a speech to the judges before the announcing of runners up and Miss C.N.E. 1978-79. Miss Thibodeau was chosen Miss Acton Fall Fair last September during the annual fair. She lives at R.R. 2, Rockwood. Canada Packers Limited announced recently they will

support the 1978 Miss C.N.E. Pageant by providing the three top prizes. The winner will receive \$1,000, the first runner-up \$300, and the second runner-up \$200. Queen of the Fairs Pageant." The Pageant Committee reported that over 600 girls had competed in local fair competitions in 1977.
