For almost 100 years now people have been racing pigeons and having the race results recorded. Queen Elizabeth II is one of many who raises and races these

One club that is involved isthe Acton Racing Pigeon Club. The Acton club is a member of the Canadian Racing Pigeon Union. The Union publishes results of all the Canadian results over their five month season.


There are 11 members in Acton who send birds to race in club events every weekend. The Acton club, which is in Central Ontario Federation with Dixie, Hamilton, St. Catharines and Niagara Folis, meetings on Fridays to load their birds and ready them for the trip to wherever the week's races are.

.The birds are then taken by truck along with the birds from the rest of the Central Ontario Federation to the meet area. The birds are released from an open field and timed on their flight

Each owner has a timing clock which prints out the time at which the bird arrives by dropping a band, that the bird must wear into the tlmer.. The band indicates each bird, by number.

After the pigeons have returned the bird's time is figured into the distance it has travelled coming out in metres per minute (mpm).

Last weekend the pigeon soll about 103 kilometres west
