

# Tax payment method changed by Erin township

A by-law was introduced at Erin Township Council meeting on Tuesday evening to change the mode of payment of taxes. The interim billing which was new in 1974 called for payments in April, June and November. The first two have been stepped ahead one month to alleviate the shortage of funds when it is most needed, hereby lowering the amount to be borrowed. Billing dates due for taxes in 1979 will be March 31, May 30 and Nov. 30. The rest of the by-law is identical, except for the mill rate, which is now 49 mills.

Problems in the Glendevon subdivision have been ironed out, and work is now progressing favourably, and homeowners who have hitherto been quite irritated over the lack of work and errors, are now quite satisfied with the progress. Three delegates from the Belfountain road, south of Erin, met with council to continue their plea to have the V shape of the road closed, which was created when the county re-designed the road, putting in a curve, leaving the V shape to the township. Gary Parkin owns the land on one side, which is lot 12, and Mr. Gillespie and Mr. Fletcher own the land on the other side of the road. The men were requested to decide how they want the land divided, then

Mr. Hungerford would be contacted to ascertain what legal procedure is necessary. As some municipalities are finding the insurance they are paying a matter of concern, Alan Snow of ROMA asked that a form be completed and returned. They feel all insurance, fire and public liability, should be written with the same insurer. They are doing a study to find out what is the situation, to see if it would justify their doing this. Reeve Matheson said it is important that ROMA is taking the initiative to do something. The township insurance on the community centre is paid by the trustees, and they have the policy, so the township

has no record. Councillor Schneider suggested the insurance company be asked to make out and send a list on all coverages, then the question-naire could be filled out. A license was requested to spread sewage treatment waste on the east halves of lot 4, concession 3, and lot 3, concession 3. The by-law prohibits the dumping of sludge in the township. Rebecca Mills has not collected all dog taxes as yet, but a friend has agreed to do the remainder while she is on holiday. B. Bulmer is doing an official plan update and wanted to know of any changes that had taken place. The Ministry of Transportation and Communications say improved trans-systems are essential. For more than 50 years the Ministry has been a strong supporter, and they hope the township will accept the invitation to become a member. The clerk was advised to talk to their representative and find out what they have to offer.

Communication was received from W. J. Gall regarding setting up a Municipal Police Force. Deputy Reeve Wheeler suggested a copy be sent to the town trustees. Regarding Harry Lockyer's application for a gravel pit license, Bill March from the Ministry requested the basis for objection should be spelled out. A letter will be sent stating that the land is not zoned for commercial gravel, zoning is not permitted, and council is not prepared to change it, because there are now seven licensed pits in the township, two of which are going to have huge outputs. The pit has been used for community use only, and traffic would be a problem. Reeve Matheson, in his investigation of the street by the hotel in Hillsburgh, found that the map does not show any right-of-way, so it does not belong to the municipality. Council was

advised to keep out of the problem because they do not own it. It is a matter of ownership and liability and it is up to the owner of the hotel to take the initiative. Councillor Schneider reported on the Ballinacraigh Day, when they raised over \$800. to put towards improving washroom facilities. Mrs. Schneider also asked if the committees that had no council member on them, could bring a report to council on proceedings. Therefore a motion was drawn up requesting all committees under the jurisdiction of Erin Township to submit a minimum monthly report of meetings to council. The newly-appointed building inspector and by-law enforcement officer, John Salmon, said he appreciated the opportunity to work for the township, and also the help he received from the clerk, reeve, deputy reeve and councillor Reid, in setting him on the right track. There were 21 new home permits issued in July, and 87 current building permits in 1978. He was commended for getting the backlog moved that had built up in the interim without an officer. Only one request of four for the redemption of the \$300 deposit on new homes was deemed advisable. The others weren't sufficiently completed on. The building inspector was given full control to use his own judgement. Mrs. George Fletcher had one sheep killed by dogs, Danny Saint had four lambs and a goat, Keith Aitken two lambs, and Mack Bros. one lamb, to a total of \$525. Road superintendent Ed Barden said \$239,000 has been spent out of a budget of \$407,000. Using \$167,000 for general maintenance, gravel and operating expenses, \$43,000 will be left for construction, sanding and snowplowing. There was no supplementary received this year. The by-law was passed to license and control dogs in the township of Erin. For a kennel license for pure bred registered dogs, the structure and runs must be 75 feet from any property lines, and 200 feet from residences. Retaining walls must be a minimum height of four feet, and it must be a clean, sanitary place of sufficient room for the dogs. Council adjourned to meet at 1 p.m. on Friday, September 1.

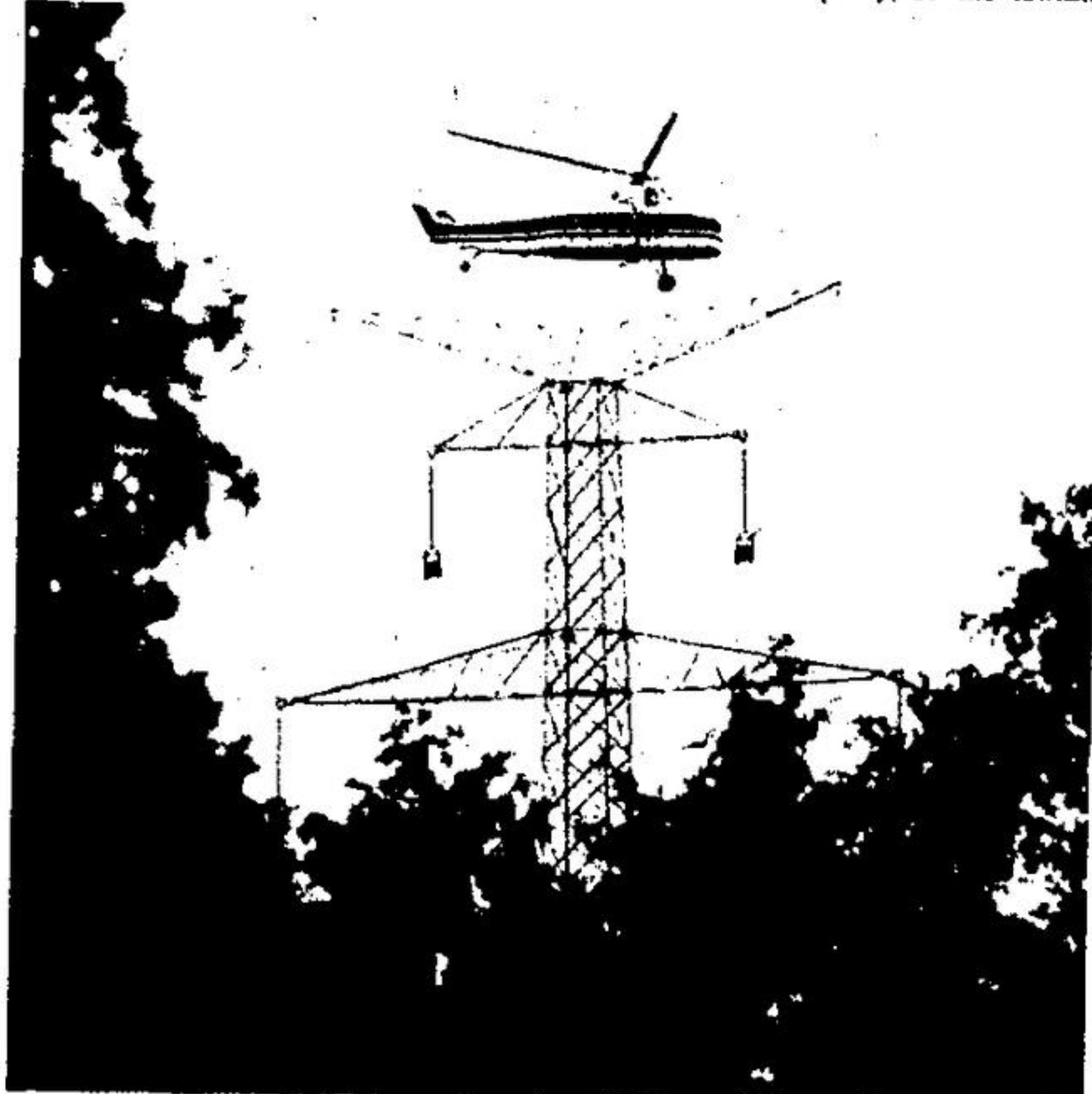

## Anita returns for Christian rallies

Pro-family crusader, singer Anita Bryant of Florida is returning to Ontario to participate in Christian Liberation Crusade rallies in the Hamilton and London areas, Sept. 9 and 10. The trans-Canada CLC (Christian Liberation Crusade) featuring Miss Bryant was launched early this year in a rally attended by close to 4,000 at Toronto's famed People's Church. Evangelist Ken Campbell of Milton, President and founder of Renaissance International (sponsor of the CLC) an-

nounced that she will be sharing her Christian witness in word and song in rallies scheduled Saturday night, Sept. 9 in the Dundas arena, (Market St.), at 8 p.m., and in the London Gardens, Sunday afternoon Sept. 10, at 3 p.m. In April, CLC rallies with Anita attracted more than 10,000 people in three cities, Peterborough, Edmonton, and Winnipeg. On July 1 she presented a Dominion Day concert in a CLC rally which drew a crowd of 2,000 to Moose Jaw.
