

# Brookville downs Oakville for provincial championship

Over the weekend the Brookville Selects travelled to Port Colborne where they won the Provincial Women's Junior AA Championships. After losing their first game 3-0 to Milverton, they came back to defeat Dryden 15-0, St. Catharines 6-2, and the Canadian Championship Oakville team 5-3.

Milverton started off their matchup with Brookville by bringing their first two batters around the bases to score in the first inning. The Selects managed to get a runner to third base and one to first.

Over the next three innings both teams went three up three down at the plate.

Milverton again scored in the fifth, bringing the score to 3-0. Brookville was left with two runners on after the third out, one at third and one at second.

Neither Milverton or Brook-

ville were able to move any runners in the last two innings and the game ended 3-0 in favor of Brookville.

Brookville then came back Saturday night to take Dryden 15-0 in five innings. The Selects started the game hitting two runners around the bases, but leaving both stranded at the third out. Dryden went three up three down.

Brookville came back, getting three runners on base but were again unable to move them home. The Dryden team managed a hit into the infield on which they were thrown out. Brookville came up big with the bats in the third inning, bringing 10 players around the bases. Donna Dennis and Margo Butler each came around twice, once on walks and once on singles. Sue McCallum held a big bat, banging out a triple sacker.

Sandy Snow, Gloria Hamilton, Laurie Kennedy and Cathy McLeod all drew walks from the Dryden pitcher and touched home to tally for Brookville. The bases remained loaded after the third Brookville out.

In the ninth, both Sue Lehn and Laurie Kennedy crossed the plate to score for the Selects, while Oakville was unable to bring any runners past second base and the Selects took the game 5-3.

Laurie Kennedy pitched the first five innings for the Selects and was then relieved by Sue Thomson.

Helping in the winning effort were Sandy Snow, Donna Dennis, Margo Butler, Sue Thomson, Sue McCallum, Gloria Hamilton, Laurie Kennedy, Cathy McLeod, Robyn Snow, and Sue Lehn. The Selects are coached by Doug and Shirley Thomson.

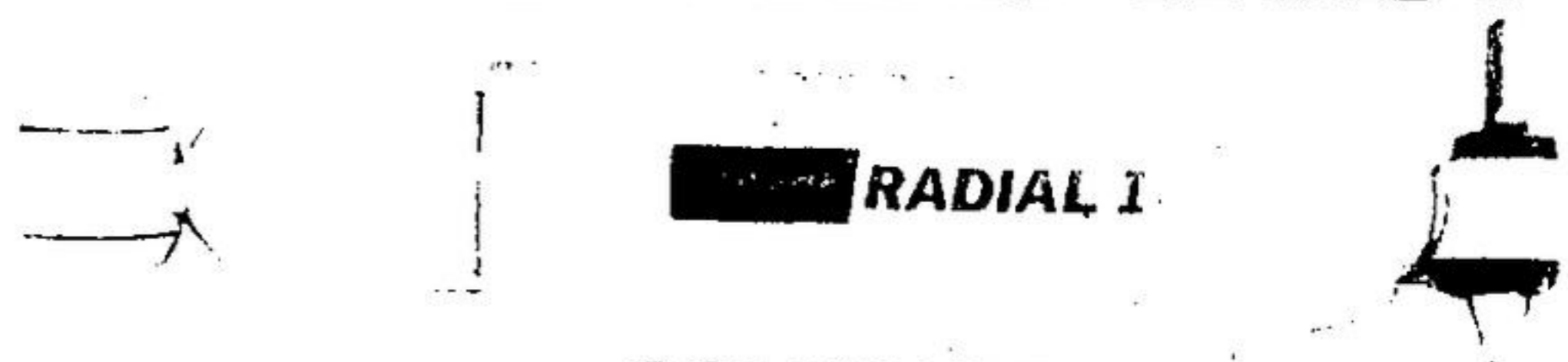
