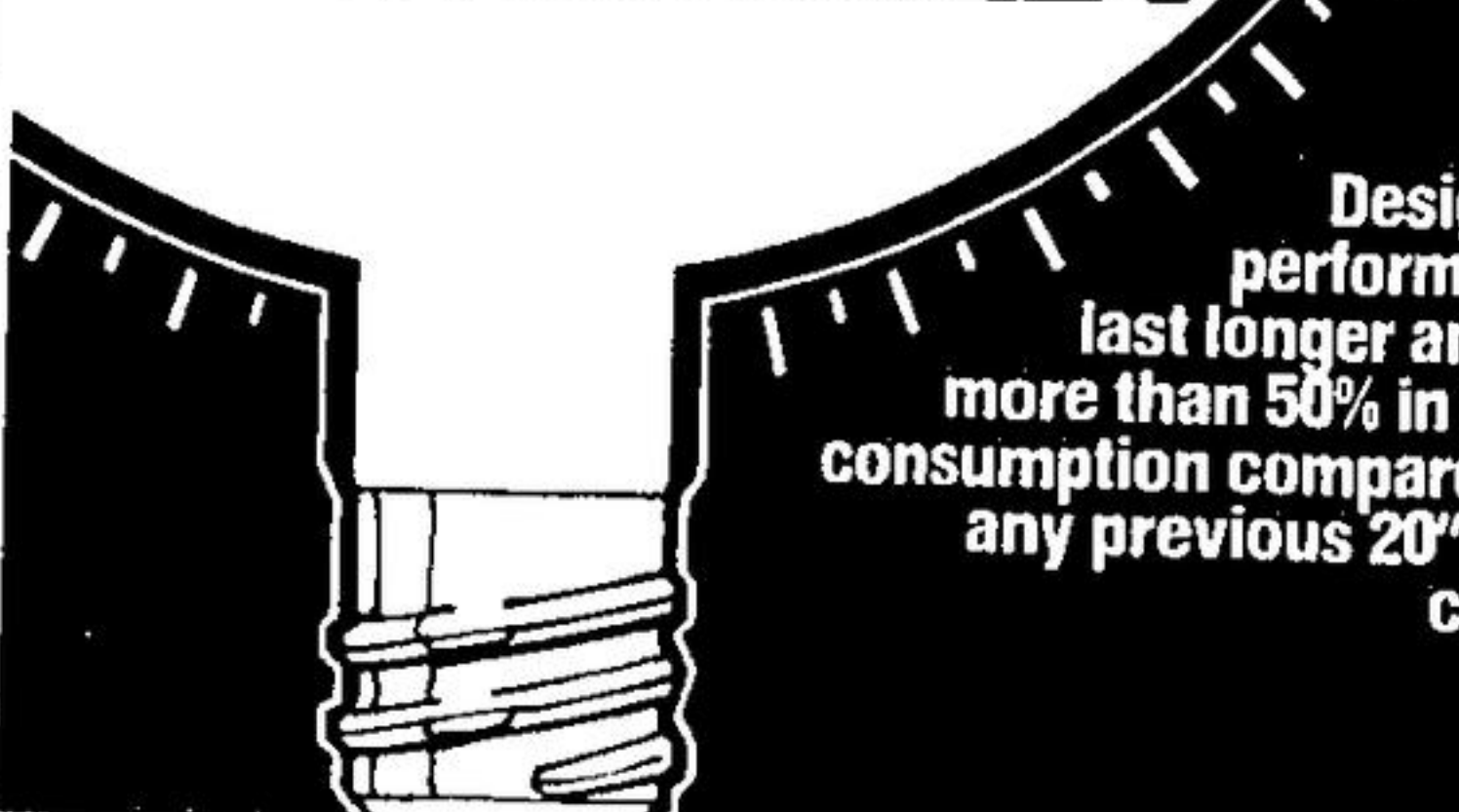
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Inflation has hit figure skating club

Inflation has hit the figure skating club as it has all of us. This year, the three major expenses of the club, ice fees, professional salaries and Canadian Figure Skating Association fees, have increased and the club is put in a position of having to raise its own fees to compensate for this.

These increases are due to external factors. For example ice fees are established by Halton Hills Recreation Dept., pro salaries are decided by the Professional Skaters Association and CFS membership, which is compulsory of all figure skating clubs, is governed from Ottawa. The overall increase for the skating season will be \$7.50 per student. Families with three or more members will obtain a 10 per cent discount.

Registration will be held September 9 and 23 at the arena from 9 a.m. to noon.

The payments of the fee at registration to be in the following manner:

Cash or cheque for the entire amount or:
Post dated cheques covering at least 50 per cent of the fees to be paid by October 15 and the remainder by November 15.

This year the professional staff has been increased by two in order to provide the best possible teaching situations. The four well qualified professionals are:

Linda Coe who has her eighth figure, gold free skate and senior silver dances, will be teaching intermediate.

Colleen DeBruyn has her first figure, most Bronze dances and will be our junior coach, teaching pre-school and junior A.

Any parents who wish their child to have private lessons should contact the pro of their choice.

Previous members of the Figure Skating Club may be aware of the inadequacies of the present sound system; this year the club has set up a special fund towards the purchase of a new system.

The club has already received some generous donations from individuals, but will also be involved in fund raising projects such as the sale of chocolates during registration days.

Parents who have some skating costumes or outgrown figure skates are invited to bring them to the arena on September 9 and 23 from 9 a.m. to noon for the Dress and Skate Sale. Make sure all items have your name, phone number, size and asking price. Hope to see you all on registration day.

Dream Maker wins

Dream Maker won the mile race for older pacing horses in 1:56.1 and paid \$11.20, \$3.20 and \$2.60.

THE ANNUAL MUNICIPAL ENUMERATION STARTS NEXT WEEK

The annual municipal enumeration will begin on Tuesday, September 5, 1978. During this month, an enumerator, carrying a proper identification card, will call at your residence for a few minutes to check basic information required in determining:

- your eligibility to vote in the municipal and school board elections to be held on November 13 this year;
- the allocation of education property taxes between the public and separate school systems;
- the distribution of provincial grants to local governments to help reduce local tax bills;
- the preparation of jurors' lists; and
- population information needed for other municipal programs.

The enumerator must record such information as the name, age, property status (e.g. owner or tenant), school support and residency of all members of the household.

When the enumerator visits, please check that the information on the Enumeration Notice is correct. If it is not, revise it and verify the changes.

If you are not home, a Notice will be left for you. If changes are necessary, please make them and mail the Enumeration Notice, as soon as possible, in the self addressed postage prepaid envelope accompanying the Notice. For any additional information, please contact the local assessment office.
