The meeting was opened with Norman Biggar explaining briefly their farm operation. Mr. Biggar showed the members his grain elevator operation and his soil saver.

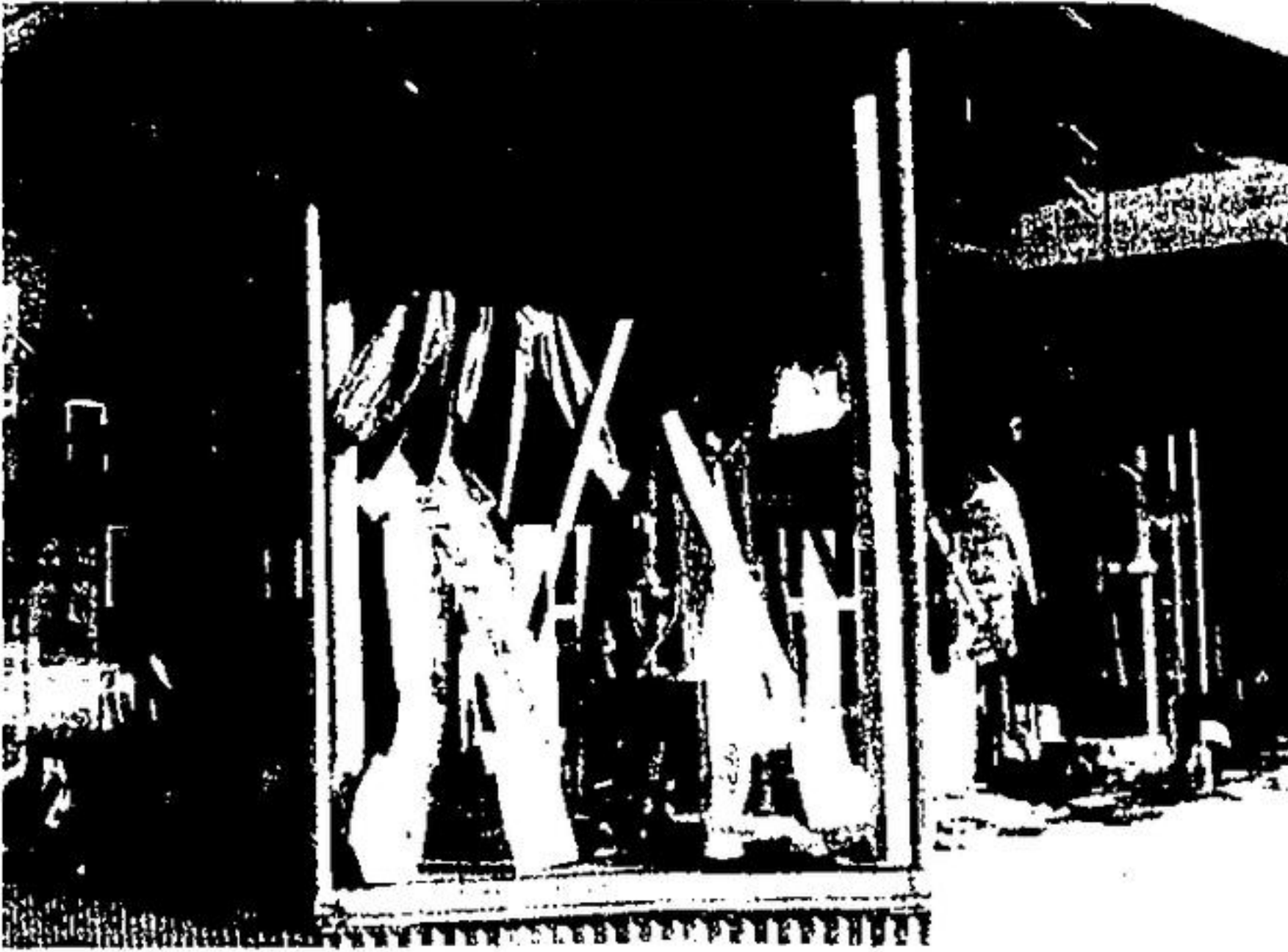
In the shed, members filled in an evaluation and quiz dealing with the club.
