has been played on a neutral diamond, Hornby, with neutral umpires as a result of an earlier incident between a Glen parent and an Acton umpire.

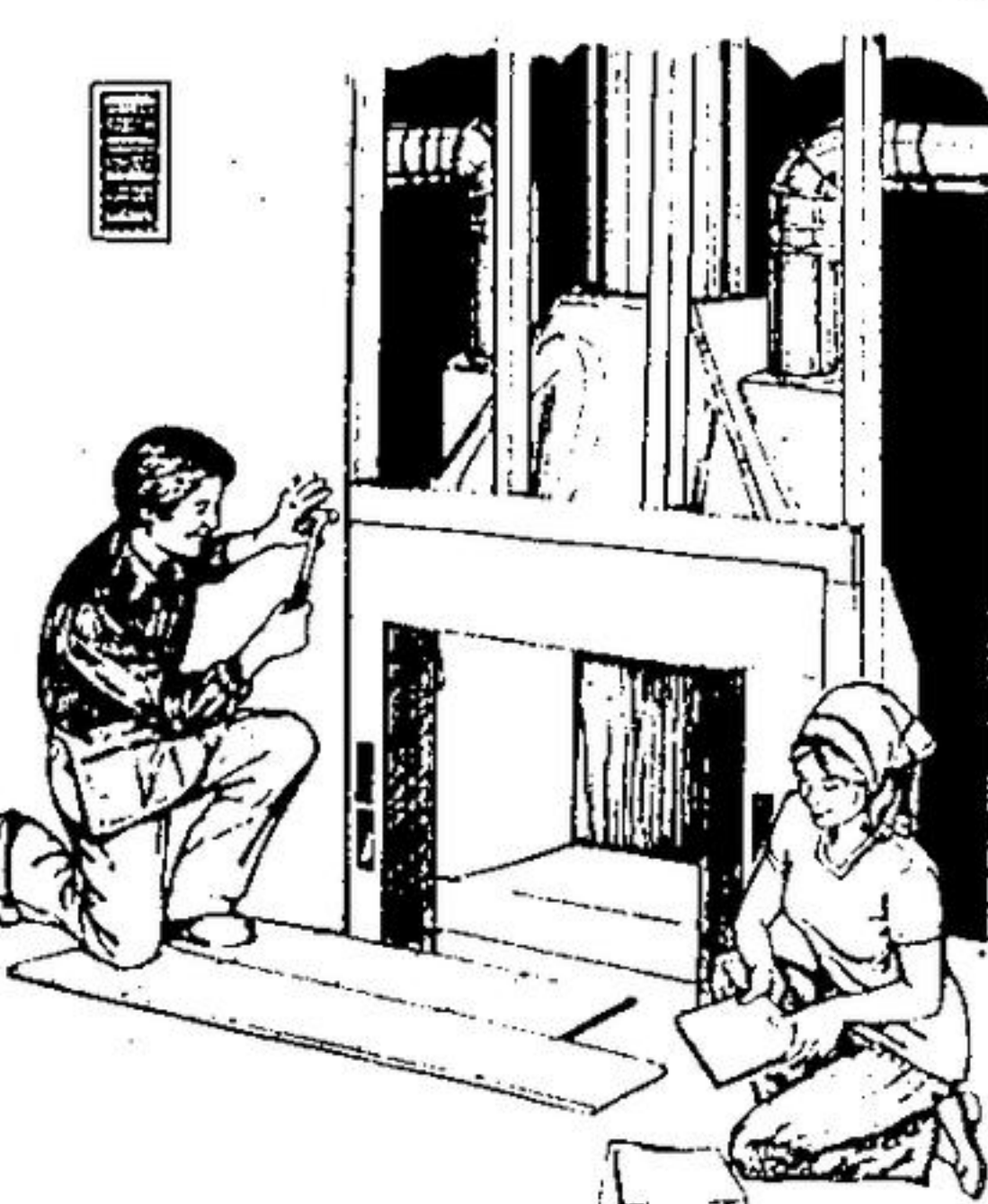
The third game is scheduled for Hornby Friday night at 6:30 p.m.
