

Prenatal seminar for October

The Prenatal Advisory Committee of the Halton Regional Health Unit is sponsoring a Prenatal Seminar for Nurses and Parents to be at Sheridan College, Saturday, October 14 from 8:30 a.m. to 3:45 p.m.

The Committee has been fortunate to obtain speakers who have special knowledge about their topics and have donated their time to the first seminar. Our seminar objective is to assist nurses and parents-to-be to become acquainted with recent trends in maternal and child care. The topics for the seminar were chosen by the Committee after requesting suggestions from the area hospital obstetrical nurses, public health nurses and some expectant parents.

Two keynote addresses will be presented. Dr. Patrick Mohide, M.D., F.R.C.S., from McMaster University will be speaking to nurses about high risk pregnancies and the role the nurse may play in a high risk pregnancy.

Dr. Philomena Newberry, M.D., F.R.C.P., from Chedoke-McMaster, as well as being the pediatrician attached to North Halton Mental Team, will talk about the importance of loving and caring for your baby.

In the afternoon a panel made up of nurses, doctors and parents, will discuss the importance of infant bonding.

Information regarding "anaesthesia", the topic of Sylvia Hogg, M.D., F.R.C.P., has always been of interest for nurses and expectant parents.

Two films which should spark some discussion will be viewed and of course, lunch and coffee breaks are included in the registration cost.
