Acton high school tennis club held a qualifying tournament last Wednesday, for the Halton Championships. The winners in each category advance to the Halton's at Bronte and Wallace Parks in Oakville today, (Wednesday).

In the junior ladies' doubles final Shirley Ancker and Janet Saxon defeated Colleen Crimless and Cheri Lindsay 8-6. In ladies' singles Ancker defeated Saxon 8-4. Cheri Lindsay goes to the Halton tournament in singles as Ancker and Saxon will enter the doubles.

In the junior men's finals Martin Osso and Tom Rosenbersky defeated Ted Nadhazy and Larry Kee 8-2 for the doubles title and Kee defeated Dave McGilloway for the singles crown.

McGilloway moved up to senior for the doubles where he and Scott Malcolm will represent the school for the third year as a doubles team.

In senior singles Malcolm defeated Gord Bruce 8-5. Bruce will represent Acton high at the Halton's. In senior ladies' singles Deb Ruppert defeated Sheila Cook 8-3. In the senior ladies' doubles Ruppert and Lynn Margetts defeated Sharon Cook and Lori Vermeulen 8-7. Sharon Cook and Steve Springle took the junior mixed doubles 8-3 from Paula Ruppert and Larry Kee. Need steering committee for new physical fitness project

The recreation department is looking for people interested in serving on the steering committee for Operation Action, a government-funded project designed to expose residents of Halton Hills to fitness and physical activity.

The department has received a \$27,912 grant under the Canada Works program and will hire three physical fitness experts to run the year-long program. A project manager will be hired at a salary of \$171 plus benefits, along with two project workers at \$131 per week plus benefits.

The project has three objectives, first, to increase the

awareness of fitness and the benefits which may be derived by participation in physical activities in Halton Hills, second, to increase the amount of physical activity by members of the community, thereby improving the general level of fitness in the area and, third, to develop a means by which community groups and agencies would be able to maintain the community's awareness and involvement in physical activity programs upon conclusion of the project.

Purpose of the steering committee is to provide community input, provide guidance and direction for the project. The recreation department is looking for

people concerned about the level of physical fitness, who also have an interest in the community. They need not have a doctorate in physical education, for example.

Anne Pickering, recreation coordinator for Georgetown, says she visualizes the steering committee being divided up into sub-committees with responsibilities such as personnel, publicity, special events etc. The personnel sub-committee would likely play a part in the hiring of the project manager and project workers.

The steering committee is to be made up of 10 people with the recreation department and 9 automatically having representation.

Anyone interested in serving on the steering committee should contact Miss Pickering at the recreation department (877-5185). The recreation department will select a committee of 10 from those who show interest.

A suitable committee member, Miss Pickering suggests, could be a teacher who sees a need in the school system or a housewife, who has time during the day to get things done. Being on the

committee may involve two meetings a month, plus sub-committee work.

The idea is for the recreation department to start the project, but for it to be taken over locally and continued at the end of one year.

The three salaried jobs, one project manager and two project workers, have already been advertised through Manpower and will be advertised locally as well.

Besides the \$27,912 coming from the federal government, the Town of Halton Hills is committed to provide a total of \$1000 for employee benefits, like OHP, unemployment insurance etc.

The objective is to have the steering committee formed by the end of September and have Operation Action in motion sometime in October. It will be up to the steering committee to decide what direction the project will take, but it's been suggested the three employees could become involved in such things as organizing local road races or going into schools to provide supplementary information and instruction in physical fitness.

School cagers downed in final
