Libel suit against CBC broadcaster

Milton evangelist Ken Campbell has filed a libel suit against CBC broadcaster Laurier LaPierre.

Mr. LaPierre, who is currently serving as the appointed head of a provincial inquiry into the

education of young children, is said to have made defamatory personal remarks about Mr. Campbell during a CFRB Betty Kennedy radio show on Wednesday August 2.

According to Mr. Campbell,

he chose to initially ignore the remarks, but had been triggered to action by a comment said to have been made by Dr. LaPierre at last week's commission hearings in St. Catharines.

Dr. LaPierre is reported to have said that in education matters, most parents are "crazy". He alluded to Campbell as "needing psychiatric help" and accused the evangelist of "lying and distorting."

"When the spokesman for the four teachers' federations express such derogatory attitudes towards parents, that's an attack to which I'll respond with everything at my disposal," said Campbell.

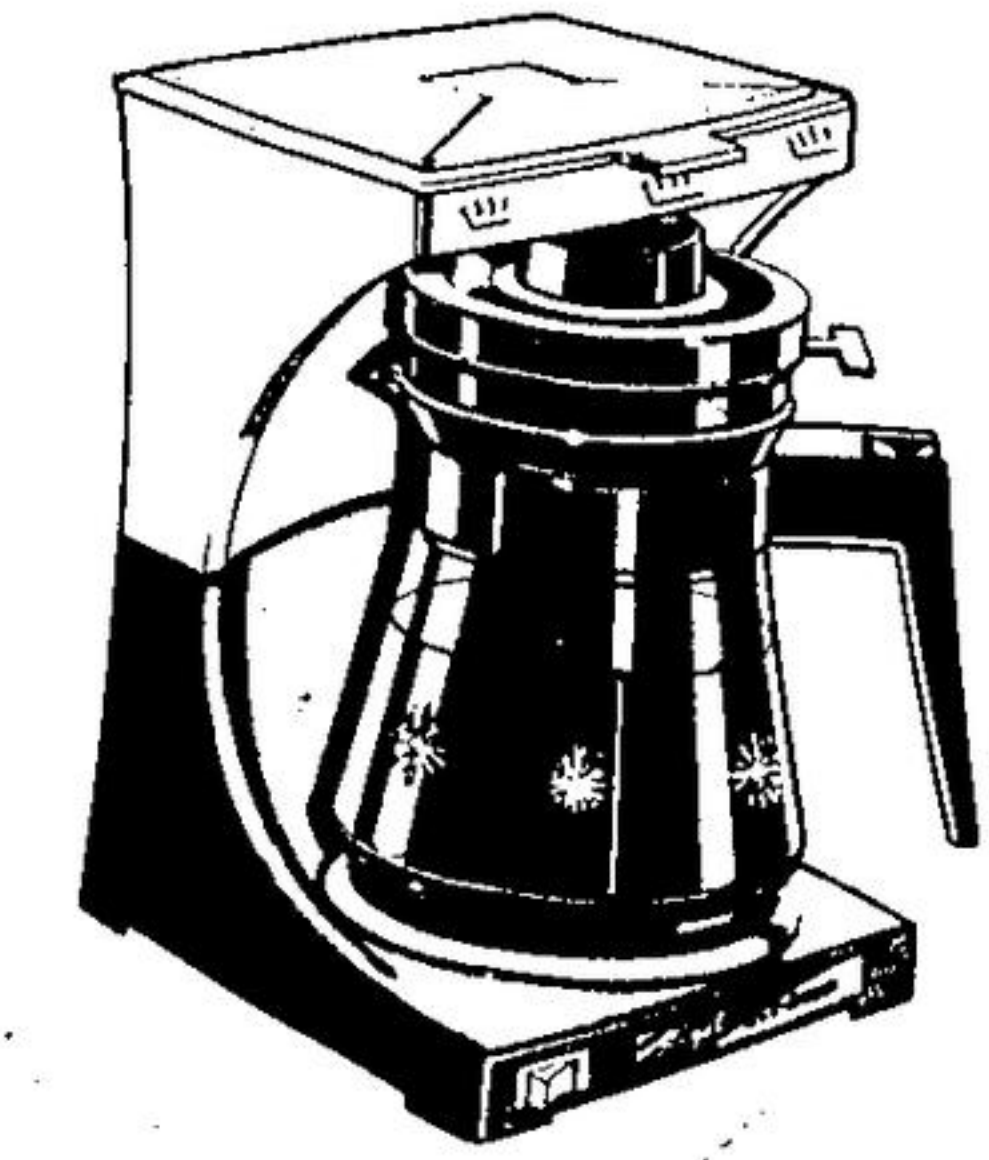

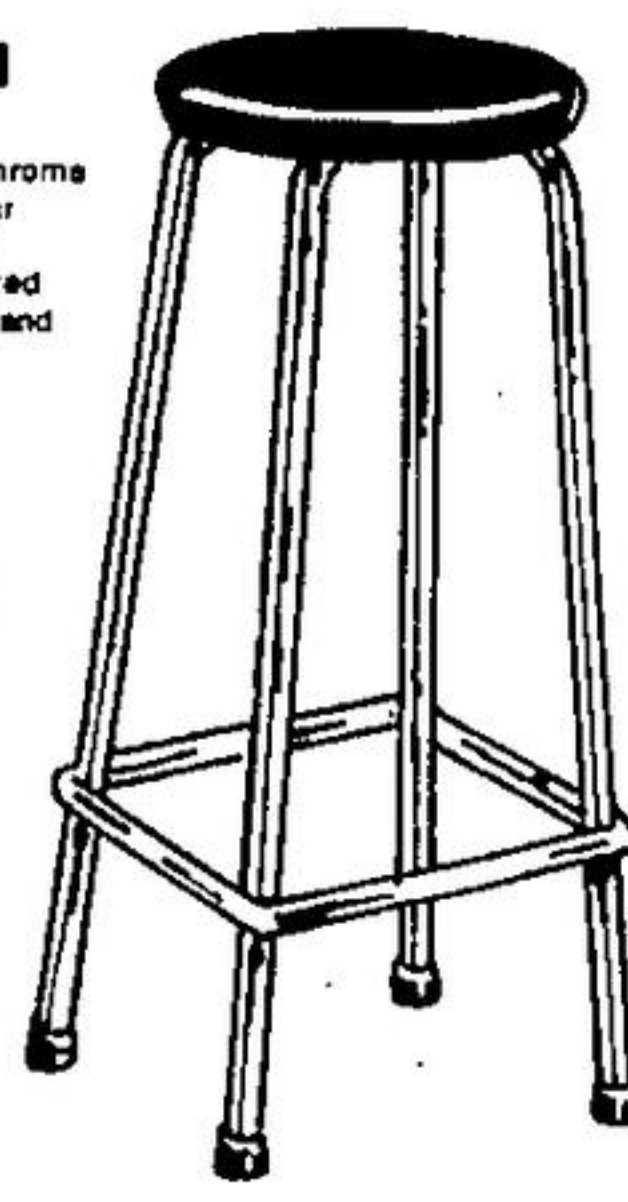

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Kitchen Bar Stool

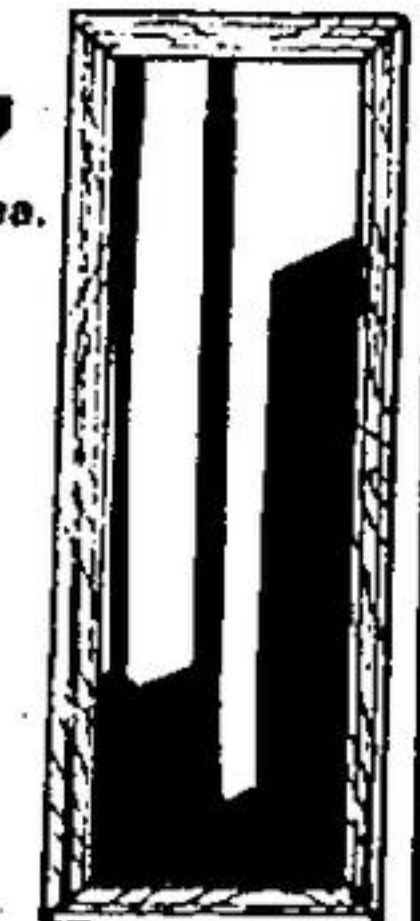
28" high chrome kitchen/bar stool with vinyl-covered seat. Ivory and black.

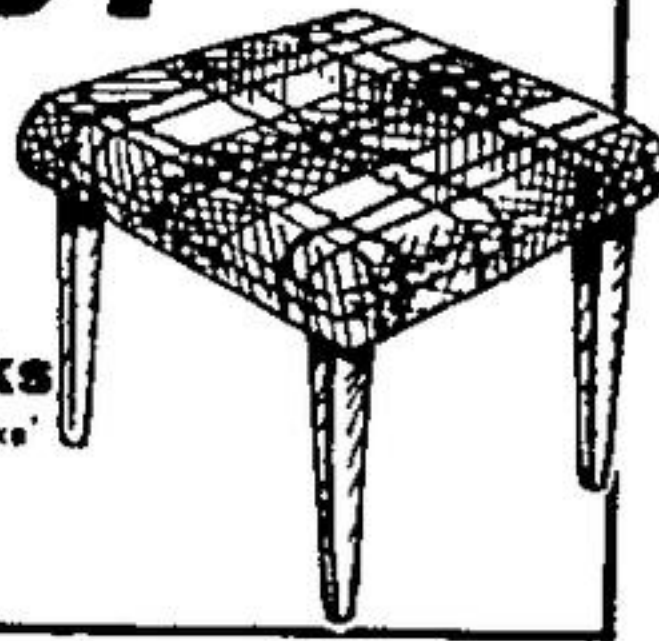
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
