Sheridan full-time enrolment is up 7%

Full-time enrolment at Sheridan College totals 6,166, representing a seven per cent increase over the previous academic year.

Registrar Elizabeth Craig said as of Sept. 25, 4,415 students were registered in full-time post-secondary programs. Another 1,681 are taking Manpower-sponsored retraining programs and 70 are OCAP students (Ontario Action Career Program).

"First year enrolment in all post-secondary divisions and schools is up significantly" said Craig. "Technology and

business programs had the most dramatic increases this year", she said.

The Community Services Division, which is still processing applications for part-time day and evening courses, expects 35,600 students to enrol for this academic year.

Sheridan's total enrolment for 1978-79 is expected to exceed 42,000 students, at eight campuses in Halton and Peel regions.

Mandatory study hall

Grade nine and 10 pupils should have supervised spares and be required to stay in the school, one Halton school trustee insists.

Trustee Len Crosier will ask Halton Board of Education to institute supervised study periods for grades nine and 10 at all high and vocational schools later this month.

He says study hall attendance should be mandatory for all students.

Crosier believes mandatory study periods would give students a chance to get extra help and teach them the value of studying and proper use of time.

He says his plan would also keep the younger students on school premises.

Band. James lives at Rockwood, and has played with Ian Townsend.

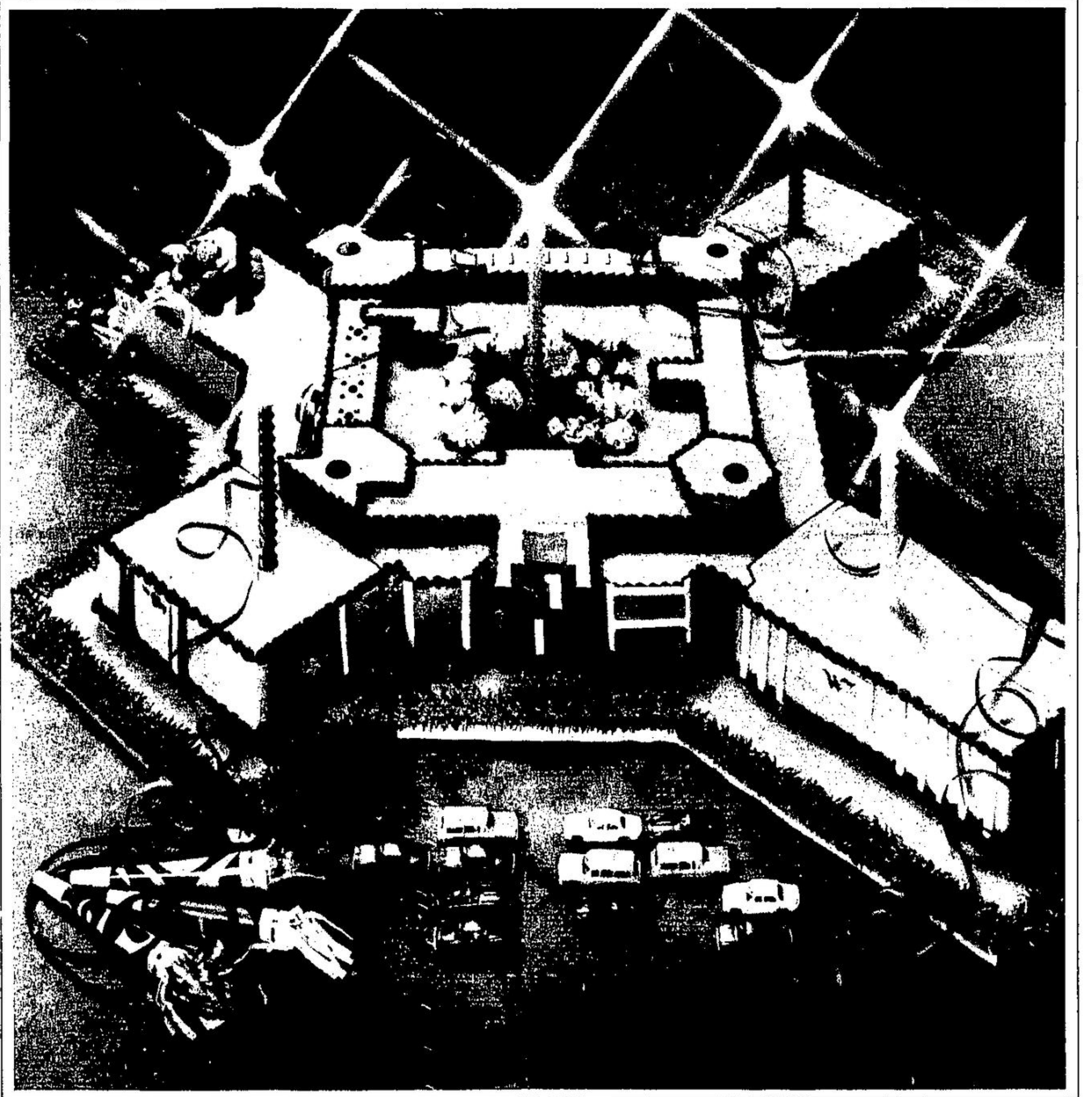
Another entertainer who's booked is guitarist David Rea. He has played for Gordon Lightfoot and Pete Seeger. He also has his M.A. in music.
