Acton and Esquesing recreation co-ordinator Karen King has joined ranks of commuters to Toronto.

Miss King has accepted a position with the Ministry of Culture and Recreation with the fitness unit. She will be a fitness leadership officer, in a crew of ten.

With her new job, Miss King will be setting up programs for people involved in fitness programs across Ontario, especially for instructors. Miss King notes she could conceivably be working in Halton Hills, in the future, setting up programs. In the meantime, she will continue to keep her Halton Hills apartment.

Miss King has been with the recreation department since April, 1976. Until last March, she confined her duties to the Georgetown area, while Anne Pickering worked in Acton and Esquesing. In March, the two traded jobs, giving Miss King a chance to get to know the Wards one and two residents.

"Recreation has changed greatly in the past two years," Miss King noted. "It is progressing by leaps and bounds. People now are having a broader perspective of recreation. It is no longer just sports program," she said.

Miss King is pleased with the people in both areas she has worked in. She explained that volunteers are an essential part of every community. Her department appreciates the work of these people who give freely of their time. "From an administration point of view, we are trying to make the volunteer's job easier and to help them provide recreation for the community."

In the time Miss King has been in the town, she has seen successful unions of a few groups in both communities. She said the Halton Hills Tennis Association and the Halton Hills Arts Council are both examples of how the two towns working together can provide better recreation for everyone.

"Even though both Acton and Georgetown have unique identities and should maintain them," Miss King said, "they both have a lot to give and share with each other. Working together doesn't mean you have to lose your identity."

This is Miss King's last week with the local recreation department. She is going to British Columbia for a week's holiday before starting her new job October 16.

"It's been a great two and a half years," Miss King says. "I've learned a lot and grown from meeting people and learning about recreation."
