**Everdale Place woes, church growth news**

Two delegations visited Erin Township council when it met in the municipal building on Monday night.

Rev. Herbert MacPherson from the Church of the Living Word, accompanied by Walter Vandell, Francis MacPherson, and Fred Rusnak, was making an application for an extension to an existing building. This house has been used as a church for 15 years, and they would now like to make it larger. It is situated on two acres of land. Council will send a map of the property and buildings to the county planner, and they and the building inspector will come and look over the property and give their opinion.

The other delegation was Al Rimmer who gave a general history of the Everdale Place which was a private school. Mr. and Mrs. Rimmer bought the 100 acre farm back in 1965 and made the decision to start a school for children having difficulty in other schools. The school was self-supporting. After four years they withdrew from the school over conflict in which direction it should grow, and they built a house on the corner of the farm for themselves. They then organized the Station Road Nursery School in Hillsburgh.

The original school buildings fell into disrepair and "hippies blew in from all over," and in 1974 they were

issued a mortgage of foreclosure. The settlement was a 50/50 split, the north half being owned by Everdale Place, and the south half by the Rimmers. There has been no school there for two years although it is reported as such, and squatters are living in the tool shed and shacks. Mr. Rimmer has notified the health department, and was now reporting to council to let them know what was going on.

Livestock killed by dogs in the township amounted to \$956. D. Heaslip lost two lambs and one ewe, Mack Bros. one lamb and one ewe; Norm Bolton one lamb and two ewes, Paul Freer three geese and seven pullets, M. B. Wong one ewe, John Abel one ewe, and Everdale Place one ram. Wolves have been seen by neighbors of some of these people.

Under the agreement that each municipality would pay

their share of costs to the Guelph and Suburban Planning Board, a motion was passed to pay the legal fees for the year, amounting to \$453.28.

A report was received from the Wellington County Health Council.

John Salmon suggested Erin Township join the Building Association, as there have been many changes in the building code, and it would be a good policy to join and keep up to date. A motion carried that the building inspector attend the convention in Peterborough and half the expenses for two days and one night be paid by Erin Township.

Road superintendent Ed Barden reported that 15,800 tons of gravel have been taken out for maintenance, 2100 tons for Hillsburgh streets, and also 4200 tons have been taken from Cook's pit.

**McMillan will run**

Don McMillan, a former Deputy Reeve of Nassagaweya, Tuesday announced his intention to run as a local councillor for Ward Three (Nassagaweya area) in Milton's Nov. 13 municipal election.

The seat is currently held by Russ Powadiuk, who plans to retire at the end of the current term. To date there are no other entries.

McMillan, a real estate salesman with a firm in Georgetown, lives in Moffat with his wife and three children.

In the 1960s he served as township clerk for six or seven years and later ran for

council. He served two terms on the council, 1971 to 1973. No newcomer to local election battles, McMillan ran unsuccessfully against incumbent Councillor Jim Watson for Milton's regional seat in 1973 and again in 1976.

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
