

Georgetown remain unbeatable giants in Halton cross country championships

Georgetown District High School again demonstrated its superior cross country program by winning every divisional title and the overall school award in the Halton Cross Country Championships at Kelso Conservation Area Thursday afternoon.

Georgetown accumulated 104 points for the overall top placing followed by Oakville-Trafalgar Devils with 451 and White Oaks Collegiate of Oakville with 501.

Georgetown boys had 54 points compared to second place White Oaks with 234, Acton's 255 and Oak-Trafalgar's 302. Georgetown girls had only 50, almost three times fewer demerits than Oak-Trafalgar's 149 and White Oaks 267.

Paula Schurr from Assumption, a Catholic High School in Burlington took top honors in the midget girls race in a time of 12:08 minutes. Georgetown's

Cheryl Thompson finished second and Shelley Lewis, third. Heather Thatcher of Acton finished sixth in the race. Michelle Noble of Acton placed 27th, Elke Zeissig 32nd, Sue Kinal 34th and Tammy Raine 36th. As a team Acton finished fifth of six competing schools.

The midget boys race was won by Steve Wellum from Aldershot in a time of 14:10. Two Georgetown runners, David Griffins and Andrew Brakel finished second and third respectively. Glenn Scott paced the Acton team to their fourth place finish by taking eighth spot. Tim Evans gained 11th while Dean Hughes finished in 31st. Gary Lumbers rounded out the team finishing 47th.

Another Aldershot runner took first in the junior girls event. Linda Orr won the race with a time of 12:05. Diane Jones of Georgetown was second and Kim Hobson of

Nelson was third. The top Acton runner was Sharon Cook with a 24th place finish. Janice Ruine placed 28th, Angie Bashkowskl finished 41st and Laurie Early 45th.

The junior boys section was all but total Georgetown domination. Roy Poloni of Milton was the only non-Georgetown runner in the top five. Ian Clark finished first in 15:57. Jon Lancaster was

second. Next was Poloni before Georgetown's Arnold Brakel and Doug Smith. The top Acton runner was Ted Nadhazi with an eighth place finish. Gord Amphlett was 18th, Steve Lumbers finished 30th, Derek Hodgson 35th, Ford Laffin 43rd and Don Weaver 61st. Acton placed fourth as a team.

In the Senior girls division Janette Wood of T.A. Blake-

lock took top honors in a time of 18:43. Georgetown runners finished third, four, fifth, and sixth. Acton had only two runners in this race, Cindy Brill placed 29th and Tammy Allsop 30th.

Of the first 13 runners to cross the finish line in the senior boys race eight of the runners were from Georgetown. Lyn Chapman took the

race in 22 minutes and 43 seconds. John Phelps of Milton was second and Brian Bisson of White Oaks placed third, Trefor Gardiner led the Acton runners with a 14th

place finish. Rob Allen was right behind in 15th. Steve Van der Eyken took 18th while Norman Bourassa rounded out the team with a 29th place finish.

Sabres streak stopped four losses in busy week

The longest unbeaten streak in the history of the Acton Junior "B" Sabres came to an end at seven games last Tuesday night in Thornhill. It has a bad way for the Sabres to start their busiest week of the Central Ontario Junior "B" season.

Since the Sabres fell 8-4 to Thornhill they have dropped games to Orillia and Brampton by 4-2 counts and were downed 10-5 by Oakville.

The teams play in the last four outings can not be considered their best performances and they must return to the type of play that won them hockey games or suffer the consequences of another losing season.

Blades 10 Sabres 5

The Sabres only home game in the four losses came Saturday night, 10-5 at the hands of the Oakville Blades.

The game had to be delayed for 15 minutes in the later stages of the first period as all the players on ice but the two goaltenders met in centre ice combat. As a result the Sabres lost the services of five players, Denis Charbonneau, Wade Vickery, Jamie Ryan, Neil Anderson and newcomer Drew Gareau for two games. Oakville had four players sent to the showers early.

Acton fell behind on two goals within 10 seconds by Reg Taccone and Kevin Adam of the Blades. A powerplay goal by Mark Schinkel with assists going to Glenn Murray and Paul Pickard pulled the Sabres to within one.

Goals by Craig Kowalchuk and Frank Carnavalle gave Oakville a 4-1 lead when the fights broke out.

The Blades counted twice to take a 6-1 lead to the dressing room after the first period.

The Sabres dropped three more goals in the second period before they found the spark on Dave McGilloway's counter with 1:45 left in this period. Pickard picked up an assist on the play.

In the third period the Sabres looked like the team that had been winning hockey games. They outscored the opposition 3-1 over the final 20 minutes and never gave up.

Paul Salvisburg potted a pair for Acton while Kelly

McArthur netted his first since returning to the Sabres line-up after severely cutting his hand. Mark Schinkel picked up a pair of assists, while Salvisburg, Bob Allsop and Bruce McPhail each got one.

Rob Bremner and Robin Inscow split the Acton netminding duties facing 56 shots. Ian Roberts, who played the last two seasons for Milton, faced 41 shots in the Oakville net.

To add to Acton's troubles along with the five fighting suspensions the Sabres lost Glenn Murray for a pair of games for receiving two major penalties in one game. Jeff Shields was sitting out a three game suspension picked up in the Thornhill loss.

Thornhill 8 Acton 4

The Thunderbirds held Acton off the scoresheet in the first period and counted three times to take a 3-0 lead. Acton's first goal of the game came off the stick of Brad Buchanan at the blueline with Jeff Shields earning an assist.

The Thunderbirds replied to the Buchanan counter with one of their own to take a 4-1 lead to the dressing room after two.

Thornhill outscored the Sabres 4-3 in the final frame with Paul Pickard netting two and Denis Charbonneau getting the other.

Acton outshot Thornhill 35-28.

Orillia 4 Acton 2

The Sabres had a very busy weekend starting Friday in Orillia. Jamie Ryan opened the scoring for Acton with assists going to Paul Pickard and Glenn Murray.

Orillia came back scoring three times in the last five minutes of the first period and solid goaltending by Don Whittaker kept Acton from coming back. Glenn Murray added the other Acton marker in the third period.

Acton outshot their hosts 46-38 in the contest and each club took 28 minutes in penalties.

Brampton 4 Acton 2

Missing from the line-up for the Sabres third game in as many days were the six players who had been suspended the night before and Jeff Shields, who was serving the final game of his suspension. Added to the line-

up were Randy Smith, Derek Hodgson, Mike Rippon and John Elkerton, who had been out with a broken nose.

Two short lapses cost the Sabres two points in this game. Brampton opened the scoring with less than two minutes remaining in the opening period. Ten seconds later the Chevys went up by two.

Kelly Shaw gave the Sabres hope in the middle of the second period when he scored from Dave McGilloway.

Twenty-four seconds later

Brampton struck again to take a 3-1 lead. Twenty-two seconds after that they did it one more time to totally demoralize the weakened Sabres.

Jamie Vickery brought the Sabres to within two but they could not pull the game out.

To make matters worse for the Sabres as the final buzzer sounded an altercation broke out between Sabres Mark Schinkel and Chevys Bruce MacClelland. Paul Pickard and another Chevy engaged in battle and now the Sabres

will be without the services of their high scoring captain for two games.

The four losses leave Acton just one game above their goal of .500 hockey for the season. The Sabres are now sitting with a five win, four loss and two tie record and must pull up their socks when they take on the Streetsville Derbys in a home and home.

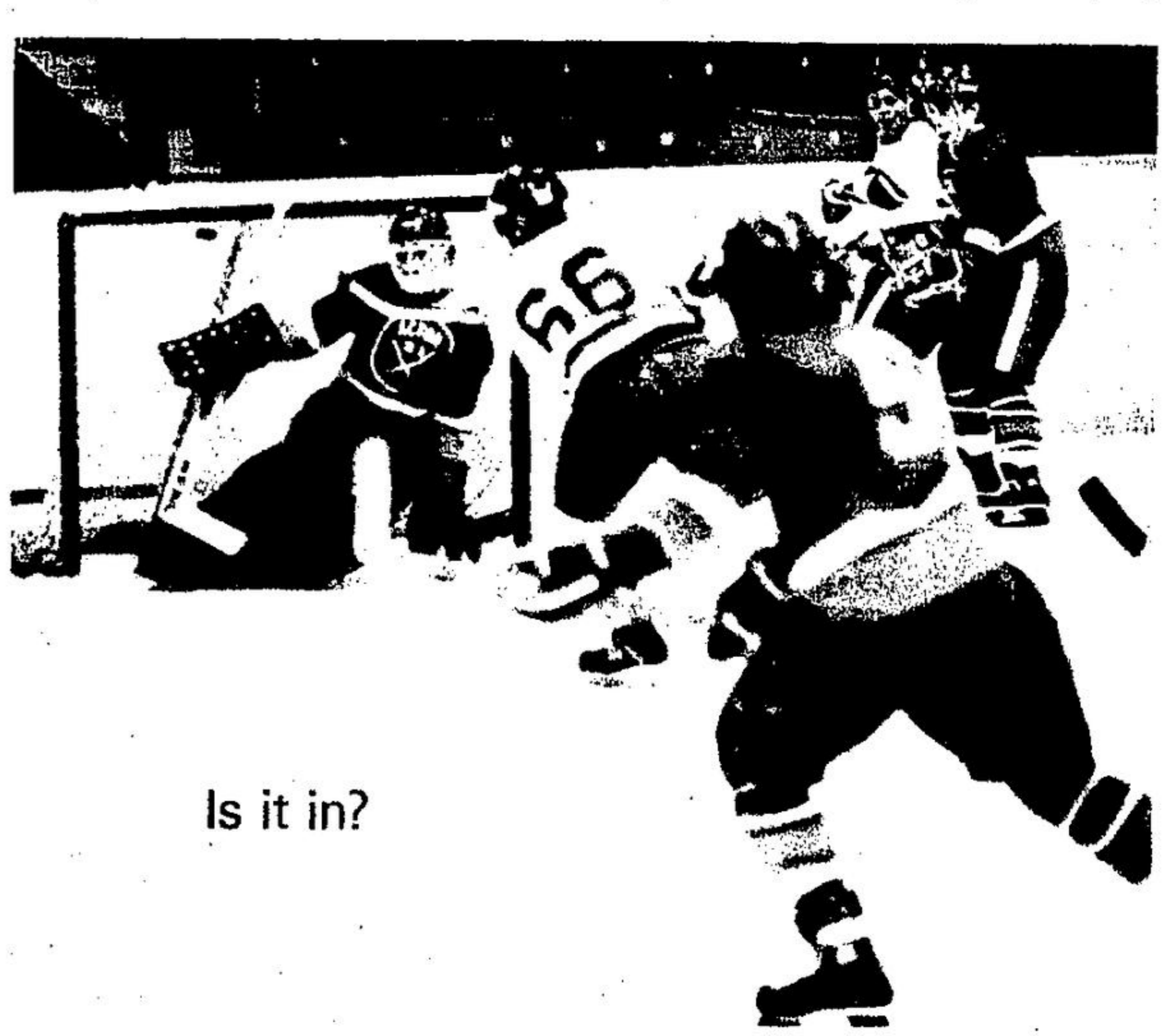
The Derbys will be at the Acton Community Centre on Friday night and Acton will travel to Derby country on Tuesday.
