Recovery House gets reprieve

Halton Recovery House, recently slated for closure due to financial pressures, will continue with its services indefinitely.

The decision to proceed with the two-year-old organization came at a public meeting held Wednesday evening at Milton District Hospital, after the group's board members were given fresh hope that funds would be found to continue with the House.

Rev. Rod Lewis, chairman of the incorporated regional organization for recovering male alcoholics, announced to the gathering he had heard from two organizations that wished to help support Recovery House.

"There is no guarantee," he told the crowd, "but at this point, they afford some positive hope."

His announcement of possible financial aid was sufficient for the group of approximately 35 board directors and interested individuals to decide—in a unanimous decision—in favor of continuing with Halton Recovery House.

Only two weeks earlier, the board of directors had agreed to terminate the project, when it was discovered a three-year provincial start-up grant would not be extended beyond this fiscal year.

The budget for 1978 had been set at \$26,000 and the group did not expect to raise sufficient money to continue after April 1979.

On Wednesday evening, Mr. Lewis made a plea to the directors to consider the future of the home, as he explained possible new sources of income.

Mr. Lewis declined to name the two groups because he said the support had not been made final and it could take up to six weeks before a major financial commitment was made.

He noted that one Halton group had already stated it might be able to help for the coming fiscal year, starting in April 1979.

Regional assistance was further named as another possibility for future funds. Under the General Welfare Assistance Act of the ministry of community and social services, money could be made available, if Halton Region was prepared to increase its support, said Mr. Lewis.

Halton Region now gives \$2,000 a year to the organization. The terms of the provincial grant would call for the region to assist with \$15,000 to the home. Eighty per cent of that amount would then be reimbursed by the province, explained Mr. Lewis.

The end result would mean \$5,000 spent by the region on the \$15,000 grant.

A possible third source of funding could rely upon the relocation of the house, continued Mr. Lewis.

He noted that an urban location would probably be much more beneficial for the home's financial status.

Despite a wish to continue with the program, director Peter Marks suggested the Recovery House might consider closing the home until definite financial arrangements were established.

His idea received little support, as members stressed the need for the House to remain open to help those in need of the recovery services.

Julian Reed, Liberal MPP from Halton, was also present at the meeting and added that termination of the program, even for a temporary period of time, would be a "risk". Mr. Reed expressed concern that the provincial grant for the rest of this fiscal year might not be forthcoming, if the House closed.

Recovery directors officers elected

The Halton Recovery House held its third annual meeting Wednesday evening, as part of the general public meeting called to discuss the future of Recovery House.

An election was held to name six directors to the corporation.

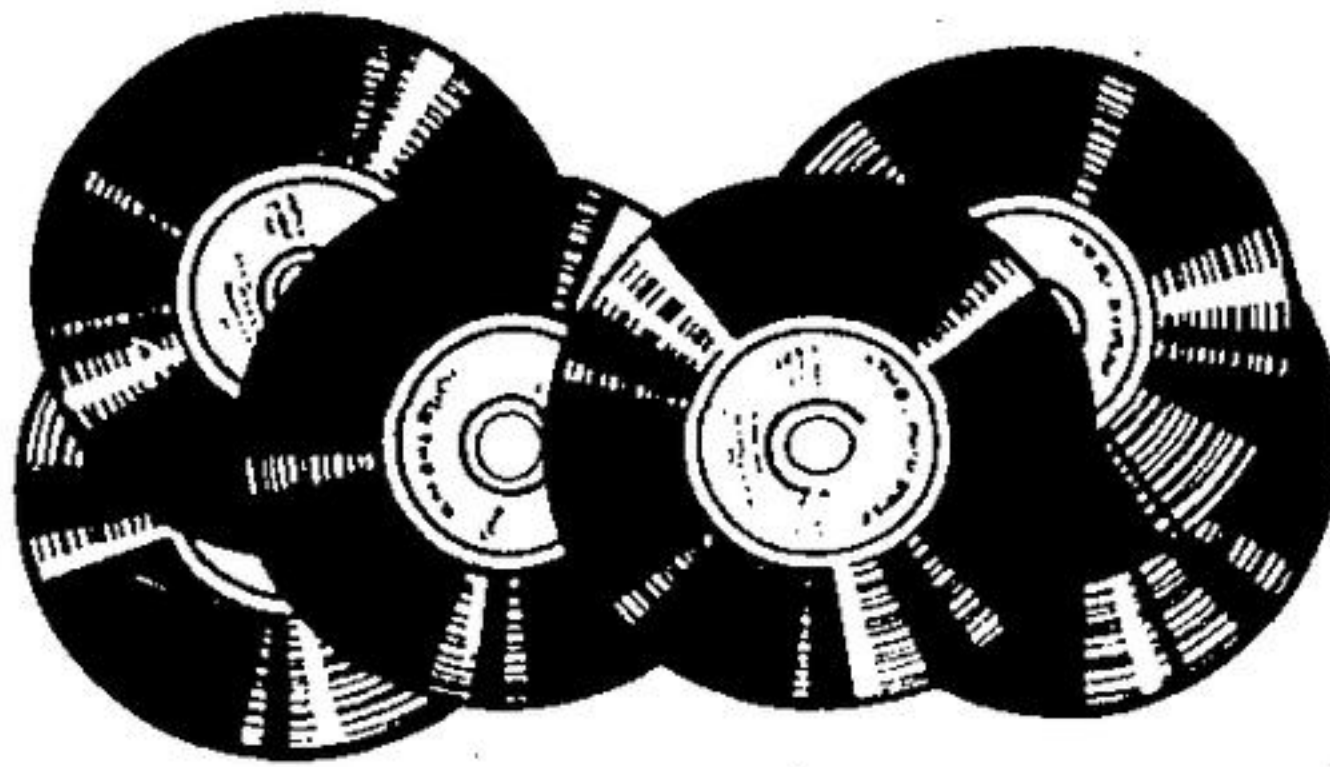
Elected for a three year term are: Pat Bogue, Bob Dalton and Walter Lickers. Lynne Salla, Rod Lewis and
