In an interconference game Acton fell to Lester B. Pearson 37-17. The losses leave the girls with a two win and six loss record. Last season the juniors failed to win a league encounter.

Nancy Wong led Acton scorers against Blakelock with nine points, followed by Kathy Krusch with eight and Mardi Phillips with six. Acton fell behind early in the game trailing 16-2 at the end of the first quarter. The juniors stayed with Blakelock over the next two periods before losing more ground in the final eight minutes.

"Acton was just as good" said junior coach Lyn McLaren "but we just couldn't score". That was how McLaren felt about the Pearson loss. Mardi Phillips did the bulk of the scoring for Acton with ten points. Donna Robinson had three.

Coach McLaren had special praise for Barb Wilson for her passing, rebounding and defence.

McLaren is already looking forward to next season when he will have ten of the girls returning. The last regular season game for the girls is scheduled for Thursday against league-leading Georgetown.

Brian Roach replaces Rick Stull between the pipes as Stull moved and is now playing for Feversham near Collingwood. Also with the squad are Brad Macpherson from Acton, Troy McNaught, who moved to town from Guelph, Chris Hicks from Moncton New Brunswick and Randy Coverdale who toiled for the Acton major peewees last season.

Jimmy Richard led the Acton goal scoring attack against Hespeler scoring twice, once on an unassisted effort and once with help from Randy Coverdale and Rick Dodds. Coverdale opened the scoring for Acton at the two minute mark from Vince Danagher and Bruce Canary. Then Richard scored his two within 35 seconds before Danagher scored Acton's final goal with four minutes remaining in the second period.

Hespeler's only goal came off the stick of Mike Garsdale breaking the bid of Acton goaltenders Tim McKendry and Brian Roach for the shut out.

Two days earlier Acton outshot New Hamburg 30-3 but came away with only a 3-1 win. Jim Richard opened the scoring from Randy Coverdale and Bruce Canary before Gary Clements tied the game with an unassisted effort for New Hamburg.

Acton got the winning goal from Dave McKnight with less than five minutes remaining in the contest. Assists on the play went to Paul Cargill and Steve Raine. Brad MacPherson netted the insurance marker from David Milne with only 30 seconds remaining.

The peewees travel to New Hamburg Sunday at 5 p.m. before coming home to Hespeler next Wednesday at 8 p.m.
