

Safety awards

Travelways honors drivers

Thirty years of safe driving were recognized when George Inglis of Campbellville received a plaque in tribute of his driving dexterity.

The presentation was made at the Travelways Coach and Bus Services safety banquet at the Campbellville Lions Hall.

Inglis, who is 70, had been driving school buses until last September.

He received the award from his son Murray, who is manager of the Travelways Georgetown division.

Inglis Sr. had at one time owned his bus company, Inglis Transportation. He sold it to the Norton Bus Line which in turn was sold to Travelways.

He was one of 44 school bus drivers honored for their safe driving.

George's wife Marion Inglis was presented a pin recognizing 20 years of safe driving.

The presentation was made by Doug Young, Travelways safety officer.

Third in line for the longest record, of safe driving of school buses, was Mrs. Ila Bayley of Campbellville. She has driven 18 years with no accidents.

Vagn Willadsen of Acton came next. He was accorded his pin for 16 years of safe driving.

Eldon Snyder of Georgetown came next with a record spanning 13 years. After him was Joan Halstead of Campbellville who has had a safe driving record of 11 years.

Murray Inglis also received a safety pin. He has had 10 years of driving a school bus without mishap. His award was presented by Young.

Two people received pins for nine years of safe driving. They were Harold Allison and Elizabeth Inglis, both from Campbellville. Jean Garbutt, Mary Ann Martin, Archie

MacDonald, and Marj Morrison, all from the Georgetown area, received pins for eight consecutive years.

Alvin Hodgins of Georgetown and Joyce Rinsma of Acton received pins for six years while Alice Johnson of Campbellville, Betty Sauve of Georgetown, Vera Thatcher of Georgetown and Mary Waterfield of Acton received pins in recognition of five-year-records.

Four pins were presented to Elsie Smith, Marg Wigley and Dorothy Hunter, all from Georgetown, as well as Jackie MacLean from Campbellville.

Three-year pins went to Donna Caves, Joanne Heath and Richard Forsyth, all from Milton. Also honored were Anna Doyle of Campbellville, May Laing of Acton and Lorna Tomlinson of Guelph.

Eleven people had two years of safe driving. They included five people from Milton: Wanda Anderson, Ed Brown, June Seabourne-Davies, Linda Wark and Bob Stringer.

From Georgetown there were Cyril Engleby, Liz Rock (Mary), Barbara Stamp, Chris Vandervoort and Leona Wittekoek. From Campbellville was Elizabeth Haller.

Among the four who received one year pins were Sue Kitten from the Kitchener area, Fran Walton of Georgetown, and Nancy Potter and Joanne Middlebrook, both from Milton.

Most of the people honored were women because they make up 75 per cent of the school bus drivers, Inglis said.

A dance followed the awards banquet.

Charges against officer dropped

A charge of assault against a Halton Regional Police officer has been dropped.

The charge was withdrawn upon the request of the complainant, a 40-year-old Milton man, who was charged with obstructing police and assault during a scuffle with police on Oct. 7.

The incident occurred in the early hours of that Saturday morning near the Milton Post Office, as four members of the local police force and a citizen attempted to make the arrest of the man and his 20-year-old

The Milton man is to appear in court on Monday, Nov. 20 to set a date for the charges against him. His companion was fined \$75 Monday in Milton provincial court for causing a disturbance.

Col. Brown dies at 90

A well-known resident of the area, Colonel Gordon Brown died October 27 in Brantford General Hospital, at age 90.

Prior to his death he was the oldest living Lt. Col. in the Lorne Scots Regiment. A charter and life member of Branch 120, Royal Canadian Legion, he was honored with a Legion service Sunday night.

He was born on the family farm on the Town Line, Norval in 1888. He went overseas in 1914 and was wounded at the battle of St. Julien in 1915 and sent home. He was stationed in various places as a recruiter during the First World War.

After the war he bought a farm in Stewarttown, where the original farmhouse still stands, but now surrounded by houses.

A picture in the Halton Hills administration office dated 1925, shows him with all the deputy reeves of Halton County but one local historian claims he was Esqueping township clerk. He was also sheriff of Halton County in the late twenties and early thirties.

He was elected to the North Halton High School Board, now defunct, then resigned to become secretary treasurer of the board from 1948 until 1959. He was also a member of the County Court of Revision and for a short time secretary of Georgetown High School board.

During the Second World War he was a member of the Veterans' Guard, and was stationed at prisoner of war camps. Lt. Col Brown was in charge of taking the last batch of POW's back to England in 1946. On his return he was demobilized from the army.

He was a member of Stewarttown Orange Lodge, the Masonic Lodge, and was the People's Warden at St. George's Anglican Church.

He was married to the late Mary Eileen Barber in 1916, and is survived by his wife the former Rhoda Whitney.

Two brothers and a sister predeceased him. Norman operated a bakery in Georgetown and George had an insurance business in Norval. His sister was Mrs. Gertrude Lindsay of Acton.

Funeral service was held at the Shoemaker funeral home, Acton, on Monday, October 30.

The Rev. A. H. McKenzie, padre of Acton legion, conducted the funeral service with Legion members attending. Interment was in Hillcrest cemetery Norval.

Pallbearers were all members of the Royal Canadian Legion from Georgetown and Acton, Alver Grieve, Leon Radcliffe, Bill Collier of Georgetown; Harry Norton, Pat McKenzie and Mel Storey of Acton.

One-liners in parliament

In his maiden speech in Parliament, newly-elected Rob Parker tossed out some one-liners that produced clapping and laughter.

Here are some of the former Actonian's comments: "This Government is like a dog surrounded by four trees. It doesn't have a leg to stand on."

The voters of his Toronto riding had sent the Government a clear message when they elected a Tory, Mr. Parker said.

"But given the state of the mails, I chose to deliver it in person."

The voters rejected a Government which is so secretive it "makes Richard Nixon on Watergate look like

Chatty Cathy." They also rejected the economic policies of a Prime Minister who was "Schmidt in Bonn, enlightened in Morocco, and unbelievable in Ottawa."

Mr. Parker was speaking during debate on a bill to give the Government authority to increase borrowing by \$17-billion.

The Government makes \$2-million worth of illusory cuts and then asks for \$17-billion in real money, he said. "And they call that restraint."

Instead of tackling economic problems, Mr. Parker said, the Government looked around at one million unemployed "and tried to fire the Queen."
