Clerk administrator Ken Richardson said that the company has been informed that the sawing, splitting, storing and selling of firewood at its property on Main Street and Mountain Street contravenes the zoning by-law.

If, however, the company does not cease the operation, the town's zoning and building administrator will come to council for further direction, Richardson said.
 Council received a petition Monday of 23 Glen Williams residents who object to the use of the formerly vacant lot as a retail firewood outlet.

Box cars need insulation when under Hydro lines

Nor-Shaw Developments have run into a snag with their industrial development on Highway 25 and Five Sideroad, according to owner Joe Shaw.
 He explained he had an agreement with Ontario Hydro to lease the land below the hydro corridor which goes right through his land but now has been told he can't lease the land.
 Shaw says he received word from the hydro that box cars, if parked more than two hours under the lines must be specially insulated.
 In addition Shaw told this newspaper the railroad

tracks must be grounded, and outside storage is not allowed under the hydro lines.
 Shaw asked council to approve a phasing of his development up to the the hydro land so he could proceed.
 Council agreed they would consider lifting part lot control after all approvals from the Ministry of Housing on the Official Plan and Zoning amendment are received.
 Shaw says he has passed on the letter from Ontario Hydro to the Interested Citizens Group who have been battling the hydro line for years, contending there are hazards.

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College information coming for students

For Grade 12 and 13 students and their parents an important week is coming in the Georgetown, Milton, Acton area. The questions of what course of study to follow after Grade 13, and what college or university to attend, are neither simple nor easily answered. Each of Ontario's 17 degree-granting institutions has liaison officers who visit high schools to help students find answers, and soon they will be in this area.
 The liaison officers can answer questions about courses and post-university

opportunities, about entrance requirements and prerequisite subject credits, or about their institution in general. Their function is to help students and their parents get as many answers as possible to the questions about post-secondary study before university entrance applications must be filled.
 Students and their parents from Georgetown, Milton and Acton will meet in Georgetown District High School, 70 Guelph St., Georgetown on Monday, Nov. 20 from 9:30 to 11:30 a.m.

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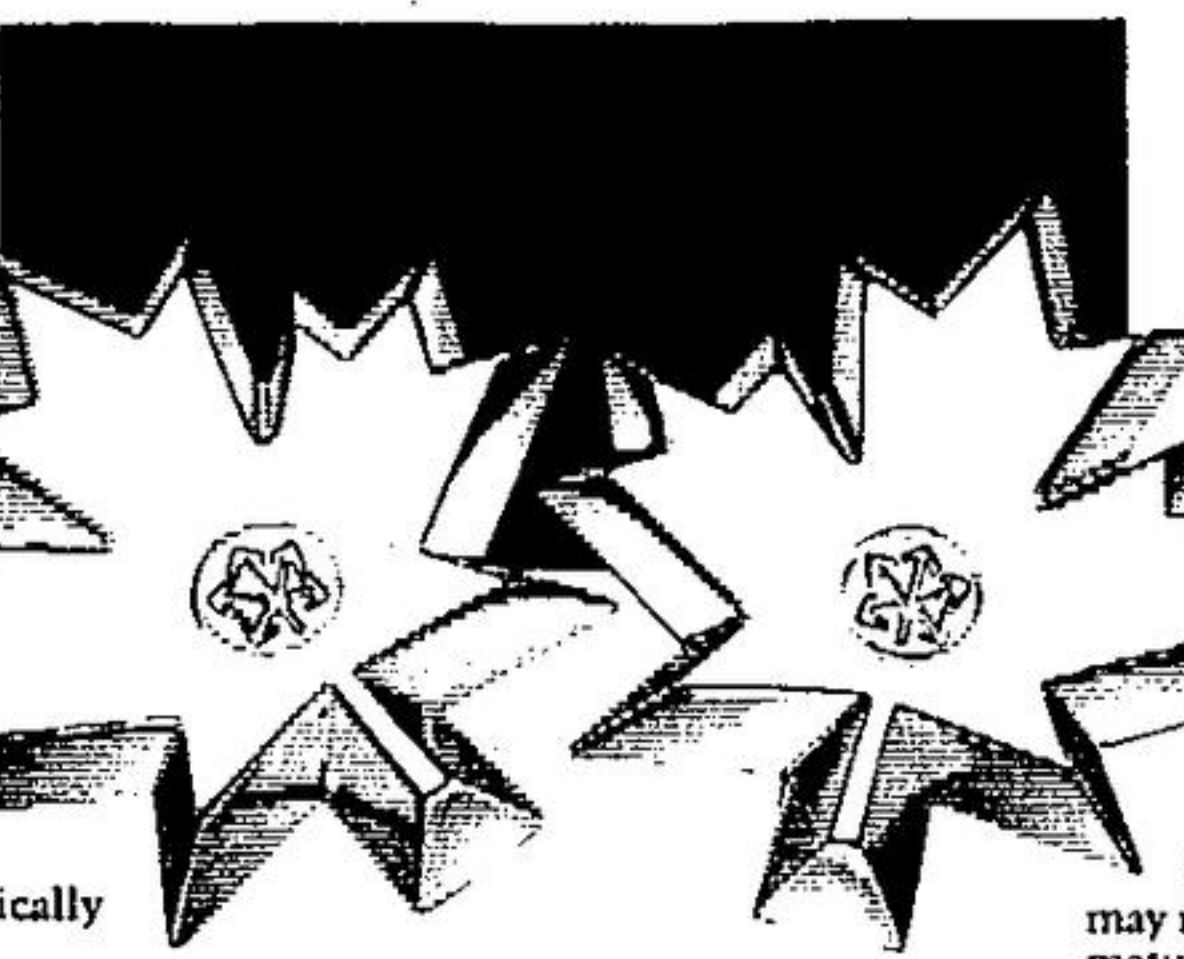
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Outdoor education

Fibre glasser in Erin

A new Canadian fibre glass manufacturer is slated to start production at Erin next summer using Spanish technology. Graham Fibre Glass Ltd., is building a 110,000 square-foot plant on 27 acres.
 The plant's capacity is 10,000 metric tons per year. More than 20 years of technical co-operation was capped with an agreement between Graham and Poliglass S. A. of Barcelona, Spain.
 The company will manufacture blowing wool, friction-fit batts and rolls.

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
