Ancaster top Redmen tourney second title in three years

Ancaster High School, for the second time in three years captured the Acton Redmen Invitational Varsity girls basketball tournament downing the host and defending champion Acton team 23-27 in the final.

Elmira took the consolation title with a 25-19 win over Walkerton.

Here is a game by game account of the happenings:

Game 1
Acton had no problem in disposing of Arthur 41-18. Lynn Margetts led the Acton attack with 12 points. Karen Chapman gathered in eight points while Sheila Cook netted seven. Mary-Ann Jansen led Arthur with eight points. Acton led 21-10 at the half.

Game 2
Tracy Turner led the Turner Trojans of Brampton to a 40-32 win over Walkerton. Bonnie Trites had eight points for the Trojans. Top point getters for Walkerton included Janet Scheffter with eight and Moira Hill with six. Turner led 18-10 at the half.

Game 3
Milton Mustangs overcame a 19-15 half time deficit to score 30 points in the last half and take a 45-32 from Port Credit. Joey Bennett netted 20 points for the Mustangs. Patti Maist picked up 10. Top point getter for the Port Credit Warriors was Kelly Massingham with 14 points.

Game 4
The final game of the preliminary round the eventual champions from Ancaster downed consolation champion Elmira 36-23. The Ancaster scoring was well spread out amongst team members. Kathy McKague and Debbie Bottom each netted eight points while Leslie Oliphant and Marnie Souter potted six. Joanne Herteis paced Elmira with 15 points. Ancaster led 18-12 at halftime.

Game 5
Walkerton scored a thrilling 36-34 victory over Arthur in consolation play despite being held completely off the score-sheet in the second quarter. Walkerton took a 14-6 first quarter lead only to watch Arthur score 16 in the second to take a 22-14 lead at the half. Walkerton fought back in the third quarter to tie the game, and then win it in the final 6 minutes. Marilyn Keifer led Walkerton with 13 points. Mary-Ann Jansen picked up 15 for the losers.

Game 6
The only overtime game of the day saw Elmira take a sea-saw battle from Port Credit 24-23. The teams were tied at five after the first quarter with Port Credit holding a slim 12-10 lead at the half. Elmira tied the game before the third quarter ended and the game ended deadlocked.

The first team to score four points was then to be declared the winner. The Warriors from Port Credit scored the first two only to have Elmira tie it again. The Warriors went up 23-22 on a free throw. Joanne Herteis netted her second basket of the overtime to give Elmira the win. Herteis led the Elmira attack with nine points. Kelly Massingham netted 11 for Port Credit.

Game 7
Acton got a chance to defend their title in the tournament final by defeating Turner 31-22. Acton scored 11 first quarter points and then played defensive ball to record the win. Sheila Cook led the Acton scorers with 10 points. Lynn Margetts picked up eight and Linda Osso six. Bonnie Trites netted nine points for the losers. Jane Gibbs had eight. Acton led 15-12 at the half.

Game 8
Ancaster outscored Milton 11-3 in the first quarter and held on to the lead as they downed the Mustangs 32-23. Lesley Oliphant and Jane Groves picked up eight points each for the winners. Patti Geis paced the Mustangs with eight points. Joey Bennett had six. Ancaster led 22-13 at halftime.

Game 9
Elmira opened up a six point lead in the first quarter then held on to that lead the rest of the way despite almost losing

it in the second quarter. Elmira led 10-4 after one and 14-12 at the half. Joanne Herteis led Elmira scorers for the third straight game with eight points. Donna Bender netted seven. Janet Scheffter led Walkerton with nine points.

Game 10
Ancaster won the tournament title two years ago. Acton won the title last year. It was only fitting that the two teams meet in the final this year. Ancaster came away 28-27 winners. Ancaster held a 20-

12 lead at the half only to watch it dwindle to 23-21 at three quarter time. Lesley Oliphant and Marnie Souter led the Ancaster attack with eight points each. Karen Chapman scored 11 for Acton. Shirley Ancker netted five points.

Sabres edge Thunderbirds, lost in Junior 'B' scramble

The Acton Sabres ended their losing streak at seven games when they edged the Thornhill Thunderbirds 6-5 at the Community Centre on Saturday night. That doesn't mean the Central Ontario Junior "B" team's troubles are over. Two days later they were back to old tricks as Oak Ridges took the Sabres 8-4. Earlier in the week Brampton had extended the slump to seven with a 4-3 win.

The Monday loss in Oak Ridges is the difference in the standings between the Sabres being in a tie for third place or a four way tie for fifth which they are now in.

Streetsville and Burlington

are running away with the standings. Streetsville has ablemished 14 wins in 14 games. Burlington has 13 wins and one tie. That tie came in the second game of the season with the Sabres. Three teams are tied with the Sabres.

The Sabres did things the hard way at home against Thornhill Saturday. The Thunderbirds drew first blood with a pair of goals by Bob Hunter within 20 seconds of each other. At that point it looked as if the Sabres would suffer their eighth in succession. The Sabres rallied with goals by Kelly Shaw and Paul Pickard before the period

ended. Glenn Murray and Jeff Shields assisted on both goals.

The second period started out with an amazing resemblance to the first. Thornhill got goals by Jamie Kennedy and Aldo Viola to take a 4-2 lead before Acton unloaded with four straight counters.

Pickard started the scoring spree with a short handed goal at 14:35. Glenn Murray tied the game at 9:47 from Paul Salvisburg. Paul Pickard netted his third of the game on an unassisted effort and Kelly McArthur rounded out the scoring for the period and the game for the Sabres.

Thornhill got one goal back at the eight minute mark of the third but could not find the equalizer.

Thornhill took 43 minutes in penalties in the game while the Sabres were handed 41. Thornhill outshot the Sabres 45-37.

Wednesday night at the arena Scott Hills was the difference between a Sabre and a Brampton win. Hills faced 47 shots in the Brampton net, robbing the Sabres time after time.

Brampton scored first but the Sabres came back with a goal from Drew Gareau from Mark Schinkel and Brad Buchanan. Wayne Deighton

put Brampton up for the second time less than a minute after the Sabres tied it. The two teams played scoreless for the next 25 minutes before Paul Pickard found the mark with an end to end rush. Jeff Shields and goalie Rob Bremner picked up assists. Acton fired 22 shots at Hills in the second frame and tallied only the one goal.

With Glenn Murray in the penalty box for interference Bob McGibbon put the Logans' Chevy up for the third time in the contest. Mark Schinkel got the power play goal back for Acton with eight minutes remaining from Murray and Gareau. Dan MacDonald put the winner home with 1:08 remaining in the game. Acton took only eight minutes in penalties in the game. Brampton took 18.

Three goals by Paul Pickard were not enough for the Sabres in Oak Ridges as the Dynes scored an 8-4 win over the Sabres. Oak Ridges scored twice in the early going and held on to a lead for the remainder of the period. Pickard made it 2-

with help from Jeff Shields. Brent Dobson put the Dynes ahead 3-1 with a penalty shot marker that broke Acton. Oak Ridges scored two more before Pickard netted his second from Drew Gareau. Acton tallied twice in the final frame. Glenn Murray netted the twine from Bob Allapp and Jeff Shields while Pickard finished off the hat trick with 54 seconds remaining. Shields picked up an assist. The goal was number 25 for Pickard.

The Sabres will continue their fight in the Central Ontario Junior "B" league Friday night at 8:30 p.m. when they play host to the Orillia Travelways. On Sunday the Sabres are in Dixie.
