Region features twelve new faces

There will be 12 new faces on the 1979-80 Halton Regional Council at its inaugural meeting Wednesday, Dec. 13.

The newcomers are as a result of the Nov. 13 election where incumbents were either defeated or decided to step down.

Representing Milton will be Bill Johnson and Gus Goutouski. They replace Jim Watson (Wards One and Three) and Jim Kerr (Ward Two) respectively.

Goutouski and Johnson will be supporting Milton Mayor Don Gordon.

Both are critics of the region's decision to locate a landfill area at Site F.

Newcomers from Halton Hills will be Mayor-elect Peter Pomeroy and Ed Wood.

They succeed incumbent Mayor Tom Hill and Councillor Garnet McKenzie, both of whom were defeated although McKenzie had stepped down to run for an area seat.

The duo will join the other three councillors from Halton Hills who were returned to office: Russell Miller, Roy Booth and Michael Armstrong.

Three new people will join the seven-man team from Oakville.

They are Bonnie Brown, Terry Mannell and Carol Gooding. They replace Gordon Reade, Arch Donaghey and Carl Erikson. Mannell was on regional council earlier.

Reade was defeated by Mannell while Donaghey and Erikson had stepped down. The newcomers join Mayor Harry Barrett and Councillors Mac Anderson, Laurie Mannell and Ron Planche.

Laurie Mannell is Terry Mannell's father.

Five changes will be seen on the Burlington council which sends nine representatives to regional council.

Heading the list will be Mayor-elect Roly Bird who defeated fellow regional councillor David Coons for the position vacated by incumbent Mayor Mary Munro.

He heads a team composed of newcomers Ted MacDonald, David LaCombe, Steve Toth and Jim Grieve.

They succeed Tom Sutherland, Don Carter and Ben Ciprietti who stepped down. Veterans who continue to represent Burlington are Walter Mulkewich, Jack Raftis, Vern Connell and Pat McLaughlin.

Few changes in official results

The official count in last Monday's elections differed only slightly from the results given out election night.

Karen Morris, who was defeated in her bid for Ward Four area council seat polled 1051 votes, compared to the unofficial tally of 999.

In the Ward Three and Four school board election Barry Shepherd racked up 2760, as opposed to the unofficial 3704 and Monty Hyde, the defeated school board candidate,

polled 1642, compared to the unofficial 1606.

In Ward Two Nick Hunsley received 699 votes, not the 715 posted election night.

Mayor Tom Hill came up with six votes less than previously announced, polling 3355, instead of 3361. Mayor-Elect Pete Pomeroy polled 7864, no change from the unofficial results.

The rest of the results remained the same.

Dogs abandoned at roadside

Lorraine Fedchyshyn is questioning some people's humanity after finding five abandoned dogs, four of them puppies, on the side of the road Thursday afternoon.

Mrs. Fedchyshyn told this newspaper she was driving along the Erin-Halton Hills

town line between Highway 25 and Churchill Rd., when a puppy ran out in front of her car about 4 p.m. She swerved to avoid it and decided to stop and scare it away from the road before it was hurt. When she got out of her car, she saw three other puppies and one adult dog, huddled in a cardboard box at the side of the road.

A trip to the vet followed for the five canines, and according to Mrs. Fedchyshyn, all animals are "in excellent condition" with no fleas, are well fed, and in good health.

"They have obviously been well taken care of," she said. She figures they were abandoned that same day.

The pups, three female and one male, are about eight

weeks old and a mixture of Lab, Shepherd and Collie. The older dog, also a female, is believed to be about one year old, but not the mother. Mrs. Fedchyshyn feels the dogs all had the same mother.

The dogs have all found a temporary home with Mrs. Fedchyshyn at R.R. 2 Acton. However, she says she cannot keep all of them and she is desperate to find a home for at least three of them. She does not care which ones go first, as long as good homes are found. She can be reached at 853-3129.

"What kind of people can just abandon living things?" Mrs. Fedchyshyn asked. "They would have died for sure in the cold and rain if had not have spotted them."

February remand

Timothy Wayne Young, of Etobicoke, will have to wait until next year for his day in court.

Mr. Young, 18, was remanded by provincial court Monday until February 8 for trial. Mr. Young is charged in connection with the traffic deaths of two young boys. Specifically Halton Regional Police charged Mr. Young with dangerous driving, under the Criminal Code, and with lesser charges under provincial highway legislation.

Mr. Young was remanded out of custody.

Two Toronto youngsters died September 3 when the mini-bike they were riding on the First Line was struck by a car. Eight-year-old Andrew Taylor and James Fraser, 12, were pronounced dead at the scene south of highway Highway Seven.
