Children's appeal seeks \$1,500,000

The Hospital for Sick Children Foundation's annual Christmas Appeal started Wednesday, Nov. 15.

The target this year is \$1,500,000.

Last year with the widespread support of the public \$1,200,000 was raised in a very successful campaign.

A tradition of voluntary giving to The Hospital for Sick Children goes back over 100 years. As a result, five generations of children have received the benefit of medical treatment and health services which are second to none in the world.

Fire prevention film library is expanding

Halton Region Fire Prevention Committee is expanding its central film library—a collection of fire safety films the Committee owns and loans out to its member fire departments in Halton.

During its last meeting in Milton, the Committee decided to purchase three copies of the National Fire Protection Association's newest film, "Learn Not to Burn" which stars well-known TV actor Dick Van Dyke. It is a nine minute, 16 mm sound and color picture in which Van Dyke points out potential fire hazards in the home—gasoline storage, wiring, smouldering cigarettes, etc.—and gives lifesaving advice on planning an escape.

Members previewed the film and found it would be

ideal for general audiences, schools, community groups, industries and cable TV use. It was agreed to buy three copies, so Oakville and Burlington Fire Departments would each be able to have one print on hand; and the third will be shared by Milton and Halton Hills Fire Departments.

Earlier this year the Committee purchased its second copy of the popular child safety film, "Where's Tommy?" This 11-minute color film emphasizes that 25 per cent of all children who die in fire are alone when disaster strikes, and shows what can happen when a child is left alone.

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Head lice scare concerns parents

Concerns of several Acton parents about a possible head lice epidemic in local schools are unfounded, says a spokesman for Robert Little school.

The fear was triggered by a letter which was sent home to parents from principal Hazen Allen. The letter read, "This is to inform you of a minor health problem which has been identified in Acton schools. It is the identification of a number of students who are infected with head lice in Robert Little, McKenzie-Smith and M.Z. Bennett schools.

"At present, the number of cases is quite low. The Public Health Unit is aware of the situation and is making every effort to eliminate the problem as quickly as possible. In order to achieve this, all must practise the utmost vigilance in identifying any additional

cases."

According to one staff member at Robert Little, head lice is not uncommon in schools. She explained that ten children were sent home with the problem, eight of which returned to school after proper treatment, under close scrutiny by a public health nurse, the next day. Two still remain at home, and should be back today (Wednesday).

Public health nurses visited all elementary schools in town last week, coming up with only a few isolated cases in the other schools. The spokesman said they are even getting in touch with those students who are absent from school and checking them.
