Holiday postings

Canada Post Office has announced its holiday mailing deadlines for the Christmas season and Dec. 17 is the last day for mailing local (in-town) greeting cards. Dec. 13 is the deadline for out-of-town cards within Canada and USA.

Parcels for distant points should be sent by Dec. 3.

Christmas cards should be sealed but can go at the third class rate of 12 cents if less than three ounces in weight. This applies to cards going to Canadian and US destinations only. Cards for all other countries should be left unsealed unless sent at the first class rate.

Deadline for mailing to Great Britain for Christmas

is Dec. 13 for sealed mail, Dec. 8 for air mail parcels. Deadline for Europe is Dec. 8 with parcels due by Dec. 1. For other countries letters should go by Dec. 1, parcels by Nov. 24.

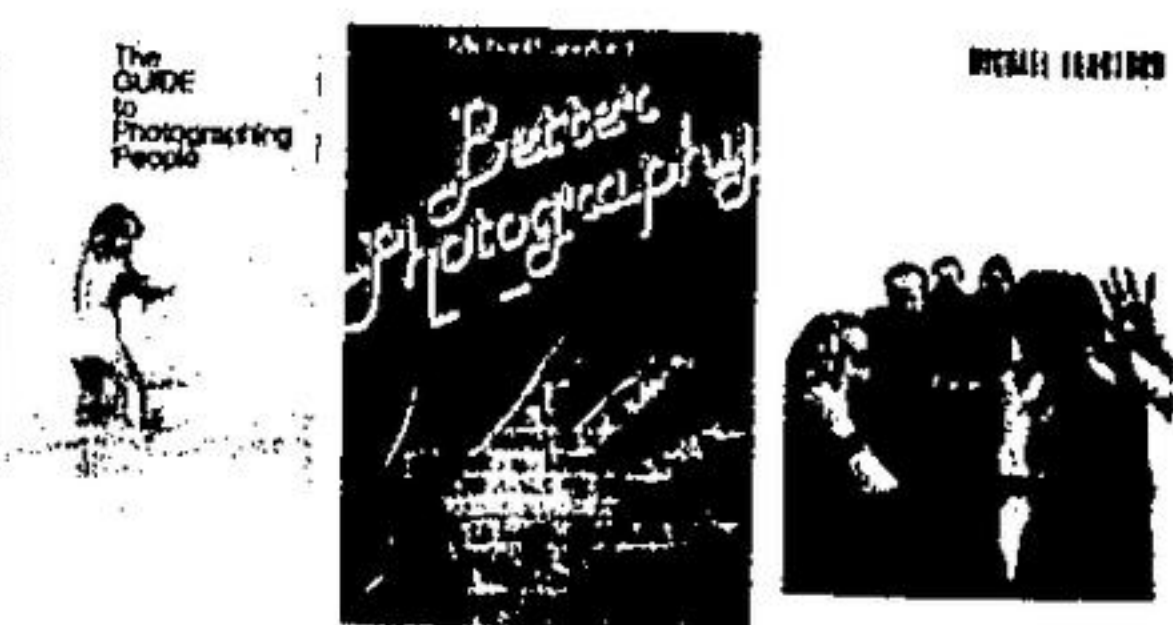
At the dinner and dance held at the Acton Curling Club and catered to by the Limehouse Presbyterian Women's Association, the bride's
