Funeral service was held November 13 for Wilfred A. Waldie. Mr. Waldie died in Guelph General Hospital November 10 following a lengthy illness.

On November 27, 1941, he married Joan Wall in the Presbyterian Church manse in Acton. The same year he went overseas with the RCAMC. He returned in 1945.

Mr. Waldie was a quiet-natured man who enjoyed hunting and fishing. He was a member of the Junior Farmers.

Left to mourn his loss are his wife, children David of Collingwood, Lynn (Mrs. Ernest Medland) of R.R. 2, Acton, and Duncan and Liljian at home, one brother William, Rockwood, one sister Margaret (Mrs. Tom McLaughlin) of Milverton, and two grandchildren.

Former resident dies in Oakville

A former Acton resident Victor McCallum died in Oakville Trafalgar Hospital on November 17 following a short illness.

Mr. McCallum, of 1273 Pallatine Dr., Oakville, was born in Erin Township on February 2, 1893.
