Council briefs

Limitation of Rockwood's population to 1770 persons by 1990 is council's resolution to Planning Board.

A head official from the Ontario Liquor Licensing Board is requested to attend the December 18 meeting to discuss the details of the Rockwood Hotel's lounge licence application, as well as previous information requests, which have been ignored.

Over half of Rockwood's residences have connected to the municipal water and sewer system, according to Plumbing Inspector Carl Meadows. The township solicitor will draw the agreement up between the six homeowners who require sewer pumps. The pumps will be purchased by the ministry of the Environment, installed and maintained by the property owners, he said. Residents who have yet to connect to the municipal system will receive a letter, issued by the Plumbing Inspector, advising them of the experiences gathered from previous village installations.

There are positions open on the Planning Board, Community Centre Board, Recreation Committee, local Architectural Conservancy Advisory Committee and Library Board. Council requests that persons now sitting on the various boards, make council aware if they wish re-appointment.

Rockwood's Thatcher Crescent was approved as a township road in a July 28 agreement between the Township and the Rockwood Board of Trustees according

to clerk Lloyd Hindley.

The Trustees want guard rails erected along the ravine side of Thatcher Crescent. Roads Superintendent Bob Hamilton does not see the necessity for the installation.

The Board of Trustees was advised to seek funding for this project from the developer, or from their own budget.
