All the milk and milk products sold are guaranteed for at least four days past the expiry date printed on the carton. This plant has gone to a great ex-pense converting over to the metric system.

The next stop was at National Cheese in North Toronto. This huge cheese factory produces many kinds of specialty cheeses using a lot of hand labor. Cheeses are also imported from all over the world and cut up and repackaged or processed for special purposes. Halton visitors even tasted cheese from sheep's milk imported from Italy.
