The grade seven and eights are still studying "New France" in Environmental Studies. On Monday we had three tests including Math, Geography and Language Arts.

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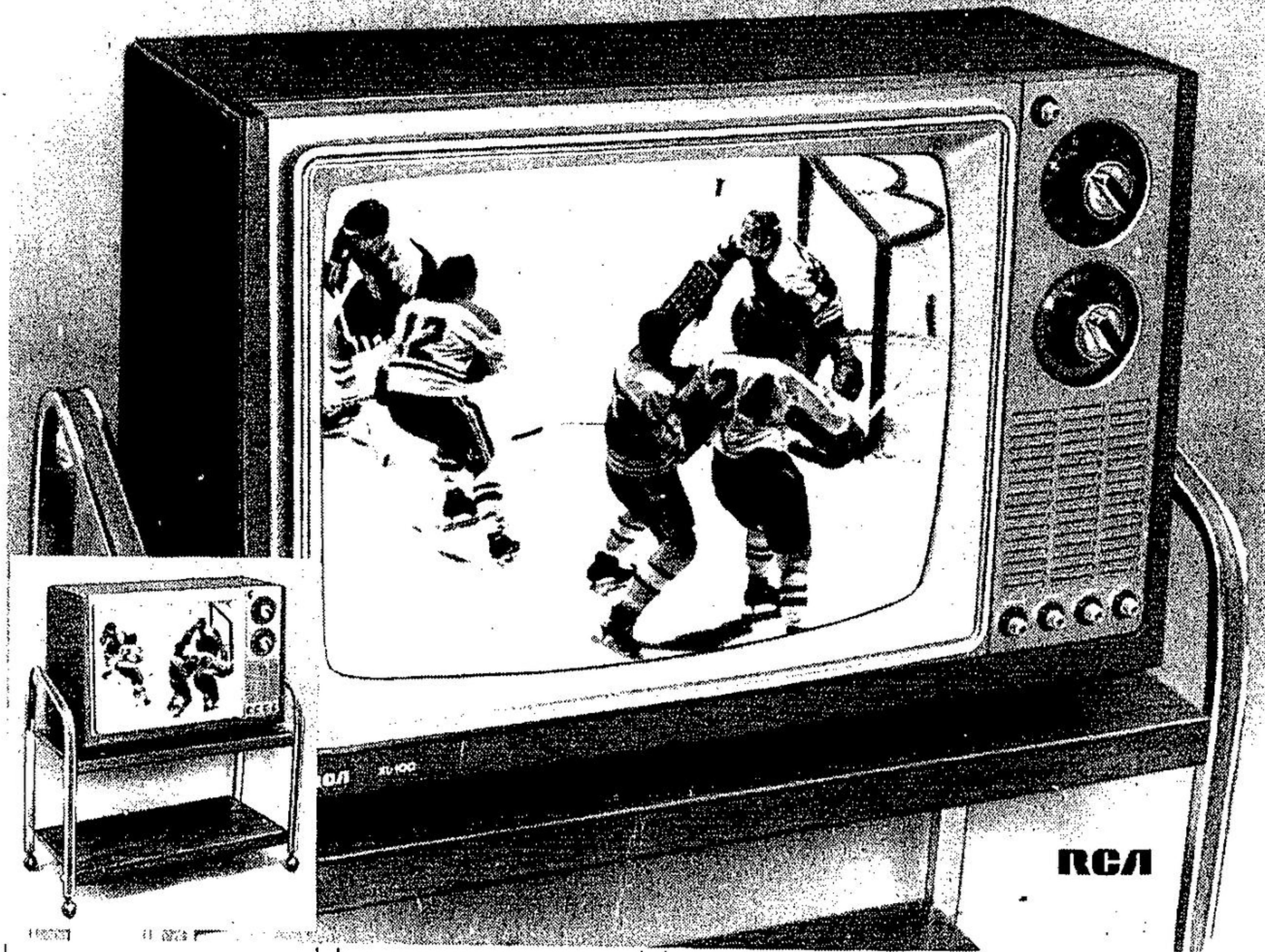
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
