The building is presently under restoration begun by the Ontario Heritage Foundation on Dec. 4, 1978. It is protected from destruction or architectural deformation by them forever. This has been accomplished by an agreement signed in 1978 between the Foundation and owner, Yosef G. Drenters.

Rockwood Cemetery and within it the Quaker Burial Ground which is the nucleus of

the present-day cemetery. The Quaker Burial Ground is a square plot, situated on the north west side of the cemetery, near the old Academy barn. Here are buried the earliest Eramosa pioneers namely; members of the Smith family, who took up 200 acres in Eramosa in 1817. The cemetery and the Rockwood Academy are on this land; the Harris and the Wetherald. family members also are buried here.

To the east side of the present day Rockwood Cemetry is a stone, marking the original site of one of Rockwood's earliest houses of worship "The Friends Meeting House" (Quakers). LACAC recommends the preservation of these sites.

 Concession 2, police village of Eden Mills. Chairperson Clark explained to council that LACAC's proposed designation sites were recommendations only. A by-law must be passed to complete the designations after the properties have been advertised and any objections heard.

If there is opposition to the designation, a hearing is held by the provincial Conservation Review Board. This board then makes a decision on the issue, under the Heritage Act. "Designation" is described under the Ontario Heritage Act, 1974 as: a municipality may enter into a covenant with a property

owner to protect certain architectural or

historic features of the property. This means that the property owner cannot alter the building's features which have been specifically designated. If the owner wishes to make property changes, he may sit down with the municipality to justify what he plans to do. The by law must be repealed if property alterations are to be carried through. Loans or grants may be obtained for

restorations with a municipal agreement. Chairperson Clark commented that the committee's purpose was to preserve, not to

Researching historical and architectural

LACAC recommends designation and preservation of the building's exterior, including walts, windows, door openings and roof line.

Saint Peter's Roman Catholic Churchbuilt in 1883 of the Romanesque design with local limestone. St. Peter's is considered to be one of the finest small churches in the Hamilton Diocese.

LACAC recommends designation and preservation of the building's exterior, including walls, windows, door openings and existing roof line and belfry. The church is located on the part west half Lot 26, Con-

cession 5, at Oustic, Eramosa Township.

St. John the Evangelist Anglican Church—
located at the corner of Guelph and Main Streets, Rockwood, was built of stone, donated by Henry Strange from his own quarries, and dedicated in 1884.

LACAC recommends that the church be designated of historic and architectural importance to the community, including walls, windows, door openings, roof line, tower and belfry.

Pine Hill Grove-Barn and home of Henry and Elisabeth Strange, now the home of the Dunbar family, located at 238 Main St. S., Rockwood.

The grand home was built in two stages from 1840 - 1860 and displays exceptional stone masonary, as well as woodwork of superior workmanship.

The barn is a unique example of Canadian stone barn building with unusual proportions and stone details.

Col. Strange owned 1200 acres where the village of Rockwood is now situated. He founded the village by surveying the 1200. acres, dividing it into lots and selling them. He laid out the streets and named many of them. He built several area grist and saw mills. He engineered the survey of the Grand Trunk Railway from Toronto to Sarnia and surveyed the first railway in Michigan.

Rockwood Academy: founded in 1850 by William Wetherald, a combination Georgian and Victorian architecture. The Academy was originally a complex of

log buildings, built in several stages. Gradually these were replaced by unique stone structures.

This great school was regarded as a place of learning with high standards, and it is from
