until the early 1980s. The report shows a drop of 668 pupils in the elementary schools in Halton next September against enrolment figures from the start of this year. Halton's enrolment for the next school year, is estimated to be 28,573. The enrolment projected for 1983 is

27,675. It's much the same story in the high schools where a drop of 239 is projected. The school board expects 20,646 students next fall. Some 17,909 students are ex-

pected in 1983. The staff took into account such items as age, age distribution, mlgration, the expected numbers in kindergarten and population.

Acton High School will jump from this year's enrolment of 745 to 769 next year and 843 in 1981. McKenzie-Smith Middle School's enrolment this year-419-is to be the

same next fall, but in two years time the figure will dip to 386.

M. Z. Bennett public school's enrolment will increase from this year's 400 to 410 next year. However, the figure will slip to 391 by 1981. Robert Little's enrolment this year at 456 will decrease to 445 next year and the drop is expected to continue to 432 in two years.

One hundred and three is the number of pupils expected to attend Speyside school in 1981. A gradual decline is seen starting from this year's figure of 155 to 137 next

Most of the schools in Georgetown will also experience a drop in enrolment. The exception is Howard Wrigglesworth which is seen increasing from this year's 268 number to 330 by 1981. All the Esquesing schools near Georgetown are expected

to decline. Most of the schools at Millon will increase in population next fall, according to the figures.

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Driver pulls over ends up in ditch

A truck driver's courtesy could have cost him his life when a Red-D-Mix driver overturned his truck on Highway 25 Friday afternoon.

According to Jim Collings, supervisor for the company, Steven Sawchuk of Hamilton, was taking a load of concrete from the Milton plant to an Acton housing project.
