### STATEMENT CONCERNING **ELECTRIC RATES FOR THE TOWN OF ACTON IN 1979**

From the extensive coverage in the press, radio and television over the past few months, you are, of course, aware that Ontario Hydro is increasing the wholesale power rate to all the electric utilities in Ontario.

This increased rate will take effect with the January power account and we have been advised that the increase to Acton Hydro will be 9.8 per cent.

The Acton Hydro Commissions have assessed the effect that this increase will have upon 'Acton Hydro's financial position and it is evident that, because of the increase in the wholesale power rate and increases in their own operating costs, there will not be sufficient funds to maintain normal operations in 1979 if the present retail rates are continued.

The Acton Hydro Commission wishes to advise their customers that application has been made to Ontario Hydro to increase retail electric rates effective with all billings on and after February 1 1979. If approval is obtained from Ontario Hydro, our customers on average will experience a rate increase of approximately 7.4 per cent. This means that the average residential customer's bill for metered energy will become \$17.48 per month in 1979 as compared to \$16.38 per month in 1978, and increase of \$1.10 per month. Residential customers who use less than the average will experience a smaller percentage increase and those who use more than the average will experience a higher percentage increase. In the case of the commercial-industrial class of service, those customers with long hours' use consumption will experience a higher percentage increase than those with shorter hours' use consumption. This pattern has been developing for some years as the fuel required to generate electricity continues to increase in cost.

Similar to 1977, Ontario Hydro realized excess revenues in 1978 due largely to export power sales. These excess revenues are once again to be returned to our customers in the form of a small increase and will be reflected in the bills you receive during 1979. The effect of this rebate will be to minimize the increase in your bills for 1979.




