**Miss O'Donnell**

Orton-Erin and area residents were saddened by the sudden death of Catherine Ellen O'Donnell at her Toronto home February 11.  
Miss O'Donnell was the daughter of the late Edmund and Mary O'Donnell. She moved to Toronto two years ago to care for her mother.  
Miss O'Donnell was the sister of Mary Jones, Martha, Hugh, Francis and the late Edmund O'Donnell; Hugh Edmund and Paul Jones; Kevin, Michael and Terrence O'Donnell and Cecily Anne Walters.  
As one of the first members of the Interested Citizens' Group Miss O'Donnell introduced other residents to the fight against the

Ontario Hydro north-south corridor. Though the corridor eventually went through Erin Township, Miss O'Donnell worked right up to the time of her death to block the line in the south. Much of her research was carried on in the Ontario Archives.  
Friends describe her as being one person who always gave freely of her time, a real fighter.  
She was born in Manitoba and when she was young the family moved east. Since about 1965 she lived up on an R. 1 Orton farm. She was a member of St. John Brebeuf parish at Erin.  
Funeral Mass was conducted in Toronto's Our Lady of Perpetual Help Church February 14. Interment was at Mount Hope cemetery.

**Lucy Walters**

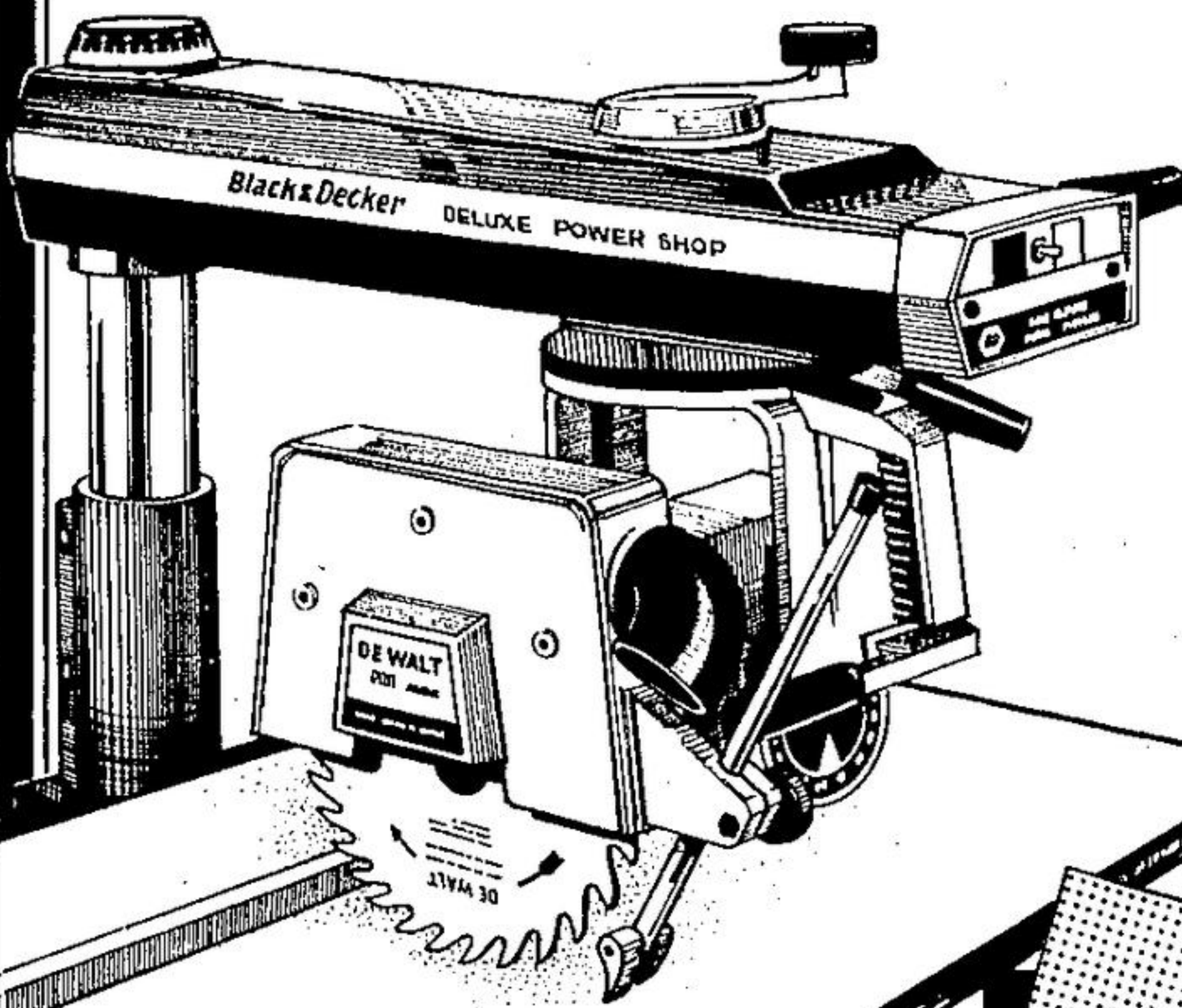
A life-long resident of Acton, Lucy Elizabeth Walters, died in Guelph General Hospital February 7. She was 77 years old.
