Susan Abray won the 50 metre event in 30.9 while Cheryl Thompson took top honors in the 100 metre event. swimmers are from Georgetown.


In the 200 medley relay Beeton was joined by Heather Thatcher, Cathy Grandy and Karen Coates as they swam to fifth place in a time of
