The Ontario Municipal Board has appointed Tuesday, the 10th day of April, 1979 for a hearing into the application for approval of by-law 78-8 which is a by-law that amends zoning by-law 74-51 for the former Township of Esquesing area.

In addition to a number of specific amendments, Section 9 of the amending by-law sets up a new zone category under by-law 74-51 to be known as Rural-Special (RU-1) zone. The uses which will be allowed in the RU-1 zone are all uses permitted in a Rural zone such as agricultural uses and a single family detached dwelling house along with a depot or terminal for trucks including their repair or maintenance and associated warehousing.
