Board staff bids to up allowance Halton

Board finance Education's committee is to evaluate a staff recommendation on increasing car mileage allowance.

The board's general meeting of trustees Thursday at Burlington steered the staff reportwhich recommends a half cent hike for the first 5,000 miles and two cents thereafter-to committee on the bid by

Oakville trustee Len Auger.

If the staff recommendation is adopted the allowance would be 22.5 cents for the first 5,000 miles and 18 cents per mile after. The rate stands at 22 cents and 16 cents. Those rates have been used for a year.

The increase in mileage allowance would apply to staff and trustees who use their

own cars. Finance

committee member Barry Shepherd, Georgetown, said he thought the rates are fine as they stand. "There's no way I can support the increase," Shepherd said.

Since Halton Board adopted the present rates, wrote Superintendent of Business and Finance Bruce Lindley, "There have been con-

tinuing increases in the cost of operating an automobile, e.g. gasoline has increased approximately 71/2 per cent, automobile insurance approximately five per cent, capital

replacement costs four per cent to seven per cent, etc." By comparison with the request of Halton Board, the separate school board has no ceil-

ing on its mileage and

pays a flat rate of 21 cents per mile. Halton Region pays 2214 cents for the first 500 miles each month and then 18.3

Car allowance expenditures for the board is expected to be \$181,245 (if the new rates are adopted). Last year the allowance cost \$187,820 and five years ago
