

ice rental rate increases could harm local sports Intermediate and Junior "B" clubs, will pay \$10 by Gord Murray an hour more come the fall. The fee for non-

Groups using Halton Hills' three arenas are facing stiff rate increases come September. The rate hikes could severely harm local ice sports already heavily financially burdened.

Halton Hills council this month approved ice rental rate increases which will effect house league and rep hockey, figure skating, shinny hockey, Georgetown Chrysler Raiders, Georgetown Gemini and Acton Sabres.

Rates for minor hockey and figure skating at Georgetown Memorial Arena, Gordon Alcott Memorial Arena and Acton Community Centre will go up \$8 an hour September 1.

Other local groups using the rinks, such as the

residents wishing to rent ice time has also increased \$10.

Another rate change which is sure to hurt Raiders, Gems and Sabres is a new charge of 10 per cent of the net gate revenue when admission is charged. This won't apply to figure skating and minor hockey.

It hasn't been approved yet, but council is also looking at raising rental of the arena halls up to as much as \$100.

Council turned down a recreation department request for a superintendent of arenas. It is estimated Halton Hills rinks lost in the vicinity of \$165,000 last year.
