## Underground home is planned for Eramosa

Plans for experimental, underground solar heated dwelling in Eramosa were looked at by Township Monday evening.

Building official John Salmon explained that four feet underground, the mean average temperature is 56 degrees requiring a temperature increase of only 14 degrees to maintain a comfortable 70 degrees. The wind cooling factor is eliminated with such construction. The proposed 2430 square foot living area would be directly lit. The outer concrete walls are encased in rubber. Mr. Salmon said.

Ross Scott proposes the residence on his 20 acre, Lot 1, Concession 5 property. He hopes to get construction underway this summer, Mr. Salmon noted.

## Flood damages twp.'s problems

by Barb Wynneck Flooding March 5, caused about \$20,000 damage to buildings and

contents owned by Eramosa Motors and Dalmer's, Eramosa Council was informed. The property owners

claim that the improper design, construction and maintenance of ditches along Highway 7, caused the flooding problem. They have initiated civil action against the township for compensation. Councillor John McLeod pointed out that this is the first winter since Highway 7 has been reconstructed and some problems could be expected. The matter was referred to the township's insurance company.

## LACAC permitted advertise proposals

Eramosa Council has consented that the Local Architectural Conservancy Advisory Committee can advertise the intention to designate six historical township properties—subject to the owners' consent.

This is a necessary step, before a bylaw is passed, completing the designations.

"Designation" is described under the Ontario Heritage Act, 1974 as: a municipality may enter into a covenant with a property owner to protect certain architectural or historic features of the property.

Speedside United Church, St. Peter's Roman Catholic Church, St. John the Evangelist

Anglican Church, Pine Hill Grove, Rockwood Academy and the Eden Mills Hotel are properties currently slated for designation.
