Lions take silverware at Goderich tournament

After suffering a first round defeat to Windsor Minors the Acton Lions Pee-wees came on strong, copping the consolation championship at the Goderich Young Canada Hockey Week pee-wee tournament.

The 5-4 first round loss put Acton in the consolation where they axed Hanover 4-3, Aylmer 7-2 and Delhi 7-3 for the silverware.

The first round match-up turned out to be the game that would decide both the tourney champion and consolation winner. Windsor, after taking the win, moved on to the "B" division championship while Acton proceeded the other way.

In their first round match the local Lions fell behind by two by the midpoint of the second period before fighting back to even the count.

Bruce Canary fired the first Acton goal with Randy Coverdale and Rick Dodds drawing assists. Jim Richard evened the score at two with only 44 seconds remaining in the middle stanza. Lorenzo Civiero assisted on the play.

Windsor regained the lead at the 52 second mark of the final frame but again Acton fought back to even the count as Jim Richard fired his second of the game from Civiero.

Windsor scored at 4:49 of the frame to take another lead but Dave McKnight found the range a short time later to tie the score at four.

With only 48 seconds remaining a power play goal gave Windsor the victory and the right to advance in the championship round.

Later in the day Acton met and handed Hanover a 4-3 defeat.

Hanover scored the lone goal of first period and it looked as if Acton would sit down in straight games but three unanswered second period markers put the local Lions in control of the

contest. Paul Cargill started things off for Acton after only 44 seconds of the middle frame from Stan Smith. Jim Richard gave Acton their first lead with an unassisted effort three minutes later. Steve Raine fired the third Acton goal of the period from Civiero as the buzzer sounded.

Hanover moved back into contention at the three minute mark of the final frame but a Paul Cargill goal only a minute later restored the Acton two goal lead.

Hanover replied to the Cargill marker to set up a thrilling ending in which Hanover managed three shots at the Acton net while their goaltender sat on the bench in favor of an extra attacker.

Acton hung on for the win, advancing them to semi-final action against Aylmer.

Three goals within 30 seconds was all Acton needed to get them started as they rolled over Aylmer 7-2.

Stan Smith started the Acton surge at 4:49 of the opening period when he found an opening in the net from Jim Richard and Randy Coverdale. Six seconds later Acton had struck again. This time it was Richard that had netted the twine with Coverdale assisting. It took the Lions only another 23 seconds to strike again as Steve Raine scored from Bruce Canary.

Aylmer got one back in the second only to have Acton's three goal lead at 1:35 of the last period with Bruce Canary and Lorenzo Civiero assisting.

Paul Cargill added an unassisted effort at the 4:11 mark before Aylmer

tallied their second of the game.

Acton added a pair of goals in the last minute as Jim Richard and Troy McNaught scored to produce a 7-2 final and advance Acton to the final where they would meet Delhi.

The Lions got on the board first in the contest as Steve Raine and Dave McKnight found the range two minutes apart to give the locals a lead.
