

Extra period marker gives Pressmen crown

Anyone who went for a coffee after the third period of the Acton Industrial League final on Sunday missed the most important part of the entire game.

A strong comeback by Family Cleaners over the last seven minutes of the game forced overtime but the extra period lasted only 26 seconds before Blow Press regained the lead in the

sudden death sudden victory period.

Family Cleaners finished in first place over the regular season but had trouble beating Dave Allen in the Blow Press goal for five and one half periods (over the last two games) before exploding to make the final exciting.

Allen robbed the Cleaners blind in the first contest as Blow Press

scored a 3-2 win. In game two Allen was again sharp as he held Family off the scoresheet until the 7:06 mark of the final frame when they scored four times to even a boring contest and set the stage for overtime.

Blow Press scored early in the match as Bruce MacPherson found a loose puck in front of the open Cleaners net during a scramble and

tucked it home with Mike Miller assisting.

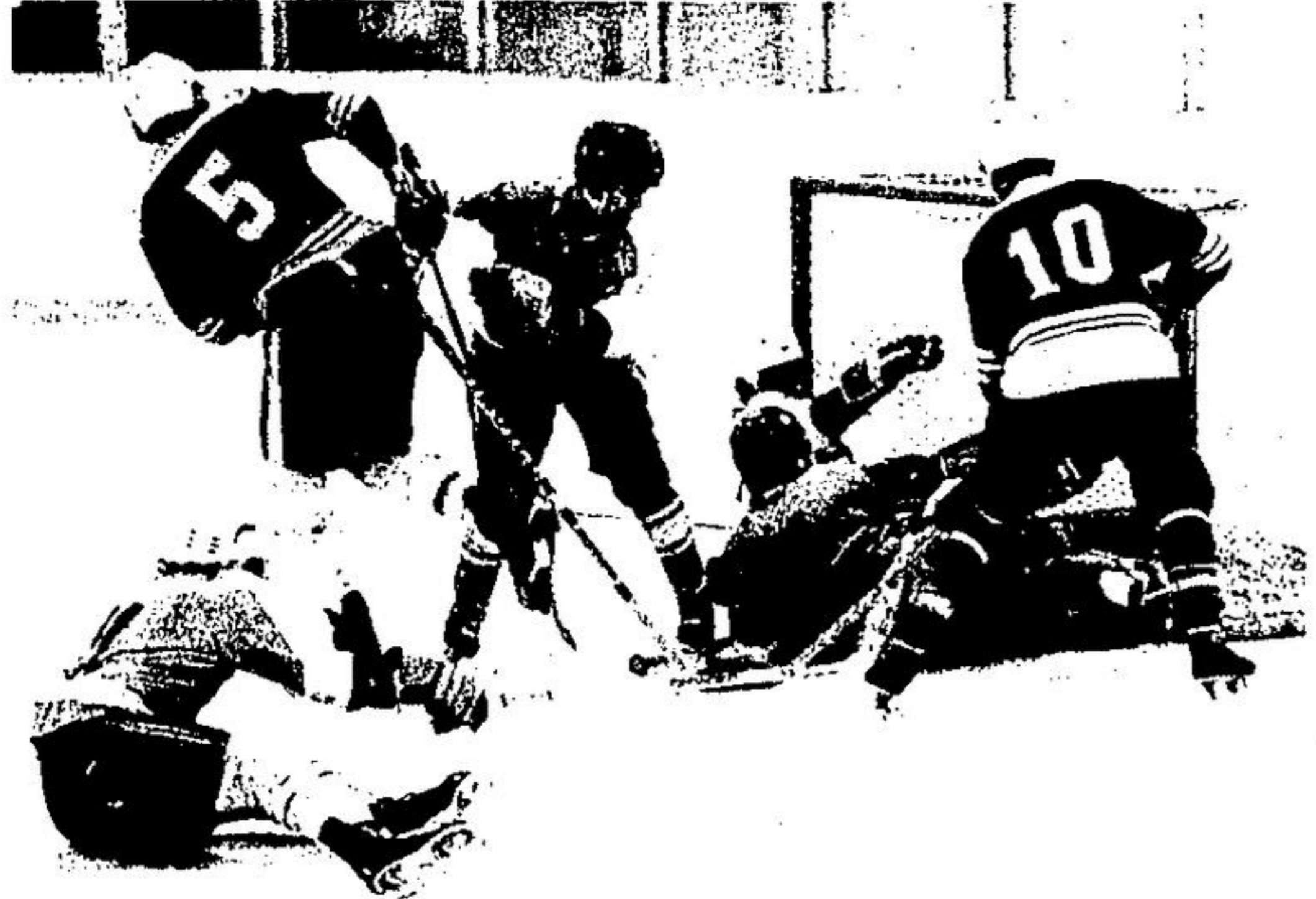

The Pressmen played a defensive style over the final frame seeming more satisfied to back peddle and keep control of the puck than move in toward the Cleaner's goal.

Canary goaler

Acton Lions pee-wees moved into the Waterloo-Wellington consolation final last week with a good goaltending performance by Bruce Canary.

Canary, a right winger with the club, played solid goal over the final half of the contest after starting goaltender Tim McKendry had been ejected from the game after receiving a five minute major penalty for high sticking.

The games final score was 5-2, giving the Lions the series in straight games. Acton won the first game of their series 8-4 in Orangeville.

Acton scored the only goal of the first frame at the 1:18 mark as Steve Raine scored from David Milne and Rick Dodds.

Acton went up 2-0 on a goal by Jim Richard at 4:33 with Paul Corgill drawing an assist.

Only a few seconds later an incident in front of the Acton net sent goaltender Tim McKendry to the showers early.

With no back-up goaltender dressed for the game forward Bruce

Canary put on the pads for the remainder of the match.

Orangeville pulled to within one early in Canary's debut but Acton came fighting back with a goal from Vince Danagher before the period ended. Randy Coverdale drew an assist.

Orangeville got their second goal at the midpoint of the final frame to pull to within two but that was all they could get by Canary. Acton replied with an unassisted effort by Randy Coverdale and a Rick Dodds counter from Lorenzo Civero before the final buzzer.

According to coach Barry Insoe, the defence tightened up in front of Canary giving him all the support they could.

"It's nice to have a player like that on the bench who we can call on," said Insoe "but Bruce (Canary) is a fine two way winger and good goal scorer. It would be a shame to waste his talents in goal."
